

Tools for Faithfully Managing Your Congregation's Resources

On Saturday, March 5, 2011 many of us from ANE attended Stewardship University at Lancaster Mennonite High School, Lancaster, PA. Although I gained good insight from all three sessions I attended, the one I appreciated the most was presented by James Martin, Consultant, Lancaster Mennonite Conference. Following are some highlights from this session.

Stewardship summed up (in this order).

"Receive Gratefully" – Celebrate! Receiving God's Generosity (Including Life which is also a gift from God) John 1:16, I Tim. 6:7, Gen 8:15-22, Deut. 8:17-18, I chron. 29:10-14, Psalm 24:1

"Share Generously" – Firstfruits! Giving as an Act of Worship Romans 12:8, I Tim. 6:17-19, Titus 3:4-6, Exodus 23:19, Deut. 8, Psalm 37:21

"Manage Faithfully" – Plan! Living God's Generosity
Romans 12-1-2, I Cor. 4:2, II Cor. 8:1-15, Hebrews 10:25, Deut. 8, Psalm 37:21

"Live Trustfully" – Trust! Depending Daily on the Lord Matthew 6:33-34, Philippians 4:6, Proverbs 3:5-6

Additional thoughts

Firstfruit Giving (giving as you receive) is more important than the percent you give.

Where I (or the church) am involved is where my dollars should go. If it is important to be a part of a certain organization, than it is important for your first fruits to go there. (for the individual it is the church they attend; for the congregation it is the District)

Congregational Financial Planning: (Percentage/Proportional Planning)

Congregational Firstfruits (District) 1% - 10%

Maintaining Your Church (Education, Property, Office, Worship, Community Life) 10% - 25%

Being Generous with Pastor(s) and Paid Staff 40% - 60% (Compensation, Benefits, Expense Reimbursement, Education)

Missions and Benevolence Giving beyond the Congregation 15% - 50% (District Agencies, Local Community Ministries, Global Missions, Relief & Service Ministries, Denominational Ministries)

Capital Expenses (Property, Remodeling, Loan, Mortgage) ? %

Every church should have a reserve account in order to pay bills and commitments when giving is down.

Ashland, TN: Here We Come...I Mean "Serve"

ASHLAND, TN

Brethren Disaster Ministries (BDM) will begin disaster response work in Ashland, TN in April. This area, 13 miles northwest of Nashville, endured three days of heavy rain in May 2010. Up to 20 inches of rain caused severe flooding and completely submerged many homes. With 578 households in need of assistance, 41 homes destroyed, and 76 in need of major repair, volunteers are responding to the call to serve.

Housing for volunteers is provided in a shared six bedroom on two floors arrangement. Meals are prepared in a fully equipped kitchen with ample room for fellowship and meals. Work to be done includes repair work and new construction which includes insulation, drywall, laminate flooring, painting, trim work, and siding.

CHALMETTE, LA

Almost six years after the devastating disaster that changed the lives of people forever in New Orleans, BDM will cease volunteer work in the area in May. Watch for the upcoming July/August newsletter with details on BDM's work in NO.

Church provides grant for disaster relief in Japan

An initial grant of \$25,000 from the Church of the Brethren's Emergency Disaster Fund is being given in support of disaster relief work in Japan following the massive earthquake and tsunami that hit the island nation. The grant will support work by Church World Service (CWS) and local partner organizations.

"This is a very unusual situation," reported Brethren Disaster Ministries executive director Roy Winter, who has been in meetings with CWS and ecumenical partners about the situation in Japan.

"Usually CWS and Brethren Disaster Ministries do not respond to an international disaster in such a developed country," he said, "but the complexity and extent of this disaster simply demands we respond when the need is so great. The Japanese government is clearly leading the response effort, but our help is needed to meet the extensive need of so many who have lost so much."

On March 11, a powerful and devastating earthquake in Japan resulted in a tsunami and a complex disaster. "The extensive destruction of quake and water is now laced with evacuations and fear as radiation leaks from nuclear power plants," said Winter's grant request. "In many ways the disaster is still unfolding, with over 11,000 deaths and more expected. A half million people are displaced and the need for relief supplies increases as supplies in the area are depleted."

The Japanese government has described the destruction and crisis as the "worst since World War II." In an appeal from CWS, the agency reported that the "reported death toll and missing combined as of March 16 stands at 11,521 people with fear of thousands more unaccounted for. More than 460,000 people are now staying in evacuation sites, where the number of people arriving exceeds the capacity of space, food, water, and toilets." In addition, explosions continue at the Fukushima-Daiichi Nuclear Power Plant, CWS said. As of March 16, a 20 kilometer radius was considered a "need to evacuate" zone.

The initial grant from the Brethren fund will provide emergency relief supplies at evacuation sites where basic needs of food, water, sanitation, electricity, and fuel are not being met. CWS is coordinating the response by working with partners such as the Japan Platform and the National Council of Churches in Japan. A relationship with the Japan Platform was developed during the response to the Indonesia tsunami in 2005.

Also, Gift of the Heart Hygiene Kits are being sent to Japan from warehouses in region. "These warehouses will be resupplied from the Brethren Service Center" in New Windsor, Md., Winter reported. He highlighted this as a key part of the response for the Brethren.

On Sunday, May 1, 1-4 PM, Brethren Housing Association (BHA) will host three events at its 219 Hummel Street, Harrisburg, location. BHA is a ministry in Harrisburg to get homeless families on their feet, founded in 1989 by an association of member churches. Members of these and other congregations are encouraged to come, including those who have given time and resources to BHA's ministry, and those interested in learning more about it.

Recognizing the increased demand for local transitional housing for homeless families, BHA has embarked on a capital campaign – the 20/20 Vision – to raise \$2.25 million dollars to share hope with more families. The campaign celebrates 20 years of ministry, looking ahead to serve 20 families in the future. May 1 will be the 20/20 Vision Kickoff for the campaign.

Also on May 1 will be the dedication of the Ray Diener House at 203 ½ Hummel Street. The Diener House is named for a member of the Elizabethtown CoB who was murdered in 2007. Ray had a passion for service and was a supporter of BHA. The legacy of compassion and redemption that he embodied, along with his family and church community, will live on in this former crack house, soon to be a home for two more homeless families.

The third event of the day will be the Homeless Horizons Bicycle Tour Send-Off, a one-week homeless journey around South Central Pennsylvania. Leading that tour is Christopher Fitz, BHA Director of Development. Chris plans to raise awareness about local homelessness through the region during his week of being homeless on the road, visiting shelters and churches. He will be happy to have other riders join him for all or part of the journey. Watch for a tour stop near you May 1-8!

40th Anniversary Celebration

Peter Becker Community in Harleysville will mark its 40th Anniversary with a four-day celebration from May 19-22. The first resident moved into Peter Becker Community on May 18, 1971, and by the late that year it had reached full occupancy of 72 residents. Currently the campus is home to approximately 500 residents.

The initial major activity highlighting the anniversary on Thursday will be an Anniversary Benevolent Dinner which generates income to benefit the Benevolent Fund. Friday will be dedicated to focusing on and to thanking the staff for their commitment to making Peter Becker Community a great place to live. Saturday will include many special activities and opportunities for residents and their families to celebrate this wonderful milestone. On Sunday an Anniversary Worship Service will be held at 2:00 in the Chapel. Special music, representatives of the CoB, a guest preacher, a social hour and other activities will be included.

It is our mission, based on the Church of the Brethren values of service, integrity, simplicity and love, to meet the physical, spiritual and emotional needs of all members of Peter Becker Community. As we celebrate this anniversary we invite you to visit us and to experience secure, affordable and simply comfortable living.

Renovation Project - Making The Vision A Reality

Forty years ago, Peter Becker Community had a vision to serve its community by providing a place for older adults to call home during their retirement years. Today, it continues to make that vision a reality by embarking on a new venture to meet the needs of its residents.

On July 12th, 2010, a groundbreaking ceremony signaled the start of a \$10 million renovation project. This project will renovate the Skilled Nursing unit, increase the size of Personal Care with additional residences, and add a specialized Memory Care unit which will include a new garden and walking area.





Carol Berster, President and CEO of the Community, stated "We want to ensure that we are the best place to live and the best place to work—this project will allow us to continue to make that vision a reality." She also stated "One thing you can say for sure about Peter Becker Community is that we are always planning and always working to improve our organization and the community in which we serve our residents."

Overall, Peter Becker Community's vision is to provide both personal care and nursing in a more homelike setting—since this is the home of more than 100 of our community's residents. It will also provide a better working environment for the staff.
