

A "Going" People

Wyomissing Church of the Brethren has quite a few successful community outreach opportunities we do annually. We begin with an auction. Handmade crafts, baked goods and services are offered-and the auctioneer makes it fun. Families from the community have bought "in home" dinners and have dined with members.

The spring event is the community Easter Egg Hunt, usually the Saturday before Palm Sunday. Eggs are hidden for all ages (even adults), and hot dogs and goodies are offered in the Fellowship Hall for everyone. This is attended by 150+ people, mostly non-members.

Later in the year we have a rummage sale, where most items are priced at a dollar. It helps members declutter and helps those in the community who need it. It's known as a place to get bargains! In November, there is a craft sale with over 30 crafters and vendors. That always draws a crowd. In December, a homemade cookie sale and a craft sale are offered.

Our band, Notes of Faith, have a concert at least once a year. Families, friends, and others come to the church for an evening of good music and fellowship.

These are the things we do that are supported by both our church members and the community at large. Anytime we can bring the community into the church, we try to maximize the presence of the church by signage, handouts, or collecting email addresses.

2015 Disaster Relief Auction Update - Tom Fritz, Co-Chair

We want to thank our supporters within the Atlantic Northeast District, the Southern Pennsylvania District, and all of our constituency who donate to the Auction, purchase articles and food and especially those who work hard to make the Auction a success. Our net proceeds from the 2015 auction were \$332,790. These funds were distributed as follows on behalf of general disaster relief:

\$77,790 (22%) for supplies to compile 12,000 school kits during the auction. These were shipped directly to the BDM warehouse.

\$60,000 (18%) restricted for Gifts of the Heart in spring of 2016 (type to be determined at a later date).

\$155,000 (47%) for Brethren Disaster Ministries.

\$25,000 (8%) to the Atlantic Northeast District to fund disaster relief trips.

\$15,000 (5%) for blanket ministry to local shelters.

Our total contributions for 2015, then would be \$332,790. Our prayer is that these distributions will help to alleviate the suffering of God's people in this country and throughout his world. To God be the Glory!

An Important Informational Update Regarding Brethren Disaster Relief Auction and Atlantic Northeast District

The ANE District Witness and Outreach Commission would like to share an update regarding the relationship between the Brethren Disaster Relief Auction (BDRA) and the Atlantic Northeast District (ANE), specifically concerning the funding of the travel expenses of the ANE District volunteers who participate in disaster relief projects sponsored by Brethren Disaster Ministries.

For nearly 40 years, the Brethren Disaster Relief Auction has diligently labored in raising funds for the Brethren Disaster Ministries. The yearly Auction is truly "Brethren Gathering for a purpose to honor and glorify God" and over the years has contributed millions of dollars for these purposes. In addition, the BDRA recently sent \$500,000 to the Nigerian Crisis Fund to assist and support our Nigerian Brethren in crisis. We praise God for the work of BDRA over the years and wholeheartedly support the work and mission of the BDRA. We celebrate and thank the many volunteers who have faithfully served and the many who attended the auction over the years to make it a success which ultimately has blessed hundreds of disaster victims over the years. The primary role of BDRA is raising funds for these purposes and the BDRA Board of Directors in their sole discretion determines the distribution of such funds.

Historically, the Witness and Outreach Commission of the ANE District has encouraged volunteers from our ANE District churches to travel to the various Brethren Disaster Ministries projects to serve and help rebuild homes of disaster victims. They have appointed an ANE District Disaster Response Coordinator and area coordinators to oversee the volunteer efforts. In addition, the ANE District has reimbursed those volunteers travelling to disaster response work sites for their travel expenses up to a predetermined amount (current amount is \$400), if requested and funds were available.

Recently, the BDRA, in consultation with the Witness and Outreach Commission, has committed to a one-time per year distribution to the ANE District for disaster response travel expense. In November 2015, the BDRA granted the amount of \$25,000 to fund travel expense in 2016. The ANE District is extremely grateful for this generous contribution from the BDRA.

However, it should be noted that ANE expenses for funding disaster trips in 2016 will exceed this grant. After expending all of the BDRA grant, any additional expenses will come from the newly created ANE District Disaster Benevolence Fund, provided there are sufficient funds. The ANE District has agreed to provide an annual summary to BDRA of how the BDRA grant was administered along with projected trips and funds needed for the following year. This summary will assist BDRA in determining the BDRA allocation amount for the next year.

Therefore, there are several things that you and your church should be aware of as follows:

- 1. Any requests for reimbursement for disaster response travel expenses scheduled through the ANE's District Disaster Response Coordinator will be processed through the ANE District.
- Individuals, churches, or church groups who wish to make donations or who raise funds to help fund disaster
 response travel may send these funds to the ANE District for the Disaster Benevolence Fund designating
 these funds for ANE District disaster response travel expense. The funds sent directly to the ANE District in
 this manner may offset the amount of funding that will be requested from the BDRA.
- 3. The ANE District Disaster Benevolence Fund is not a part of the annual ANE District Ministry Investment Plan. The Fund was established as a way for our ANE congregations to partner together for special benevolent purposes, as well as to serve as a funding mechanism for ANE District disaster response travel expenses that exceed the annual BDRA contribution.

The Atlantic Northeast District has been extremely blessed to be at the forefront of disaster ministries by the strong financial support through the BDRA's yearly auction and the many volunteers who have traveled to and served on disaster relief projects throughout the country. We are so grateful that the Lord has blessed this work and for the many who have volunteered and supported this work financially. It is our hope that you and your church will continue to support these ministries in the future.

Junior High Lock In

Held Feb. 12-13, with swimming, basketball, volleyball, 9 square in the air, dodgeball, kickball, ultimate, football, movies...well there was just no time for sleep! In addition, there was lots of food and great connection with friends. Sarah Kolbe led devotions and a game centered on trusting God.

Junior High AND Senior High Service Project

On March 12th, we had just over 100 people attend this event. Due to the large number, we split into two groups. One group started at the Material Resources Center of MCC in Ephrata. Participants worked at various stations such as recycling, which included things like sorting books, separating the book's spine, covers and pages (spine and covers reused for insulation and pages reused as paper towels) and baling the separated book covers and pages, baling cardboard (cardboard reused for insulation). We also cut up T-shirts (reused as rags for mechanics, plumbers, etc.) and jeans (reused for rugs, comforters, or blankets).

Another group assembled and checked school kits for children (to be distributed to children around the world without basic education materials). While that group was at the MRC, our other group was down the road at Ephrata CoB. Those at the church had the option of dodgeball, an art project, or other games. Mid-morning the groups switched so that all were able to serve at MCC. At noon we gathered for lunch, devotions and then had the option of staying to play.

Youth Peace Team

Congratulations to **Jenna Walmer**, a District Youth Cabinet Alum and member of Palmyra CoB, for being chosen as a member of the Youth Peace Team for 2016! This team travels to camps across the denomination, teaching about peace, justice, and reconciliation. The group also gives peace programs at a variety of camps and conferences over the summer. The goal of the team's work is to talk with other young people about the Christian message and the Brethren tradition of peacemaking.

BIBLE SCHOOL Public School Floring

ALL IN: Going. Glowing. Growing. Godly. This is our three-year focus for our District. This year we are specifically looking at GOING, and as we do that I want to take this space to tell you about Bible2School and how they are going into public schools to reach children with the word of God.

Section 1546 of the Pennsylvania School Code allows children, with parental permission, to be released from school for religious education. This law allows Bible2School to offer a one-hour program on a weekly basis from September to April. Bible2School is a non-profit organization that provides non-denominational Bible classes to elementary grade students in Lancaster County public schools. Kids participate in lively worship, hear a Bible story, break into small groups to discuss how they can apply the Bible lesson in their lives, and pray together. In the article below, Kent Rice, Pastor of Outreach and Mission at Hempfield CoB, shares some of his thoughts on the organization.

Sunday Might Be Too Late—My Experience With Bible2School

It's been over fifty years since the Supreme Court ruled that organized prayer was not appropriate in public schools and I continue to hear more laments about that ruling than I do celebrations of young people becoming interested in the Gospel! One organization that is "playing by the rules" yet still chalking up victories in Lancaster County, PA is Bible2School. By working within the legal parameters that religious classes can take place if they: are off school grounds; use no public school funds; and are not promoted by school officials, Bible2School impacts hundreds of school children each week with short, simple, clear and creative Christian studies.

Last year was my first year volunteering as a teacher and I remember the first day that the school bus pulled up and the kids came walking briskly (well, running actually!) to the door of a church located a mile away from their elementary school. Eighteen second-graders piled into the room and were *excited* to be there! It was clear that they expected something cool to happen and our group of teachers and small group leaders was not going to disappoint them. But perhaps even more amazing to me was how important I suddenly was to these kids—they gave me high fives, told me about their families, spilled any beverage that wasn't a juice box and then, before you know it, were piling back into the bus. The whole year went like that. My job was leading the large group lessons and this group loved to help act out the stories (with predictably mixed results!). One week we gathered inside a huge inflated "whale" to tell the story of Jonah. It was awesome!

Sunday Might Be Too Late—Continued

Sometimes as I would be trying to convince my small group of three boys to stop playing with everything and answer my questions, I would glance over at my friend Deb's group of three girls sitting quietly and praying with folded hands. But that was okay, because I had one kid in particular (I'll call him "Danny") who was my "problem child"—so unfocused and uncooperative at the beginning that I wondered why he came at all. In fact, the only thing Danny and I agreed on was that my second grade school picture was hilarious! (I had brought it in the first week to show them what I looked like.) But over the year, Danny changed. He started answering real questions about the Bible. He seemed to think more deeply and he stopped withholding high-fives from me. He had really grown, both spiritually and emotionally. And on the last week I gave him my second-grade autographed picture!

Like so many who go on mission trips wanting to minister to others but who end up feeling like *they* were ministered to, so have I felt in my second year of teaching at Bible2School. Last week the third graders (from a different school) whispered along to a Believer's Prayer at the end of a movie—not because their friends were doing it, not because they wanted to earn points with the adults, but because they were owning the knowledge of what a relationship with Jesus Christ can be. My eyes filled with tears at the beautiful sound of city kids who were every conceivable shape, size and color praying together when they could be at recess with their friends.

Not everyone has the luxury of being able to spend their lunch hour with these kids and I'm thankful that my schedule is flexible enough to do it—that as a minister it's even part of "my job." But mostly I'm thankful for every moment in which a child learns that Jesus loves them and that there are people who love them, too. I'm not naïve enough to think they will remember all the lessons I teach, but I do believe they will remember that they learned something about God from a couple of caring people once a week. And I will gladly pick up tater tots from the floor for a *year* if even *one* kid comes to understand that nothing can separate him or her from the love of God through Jesus Christ.

Thank God for Bible2School!

Is it not ironic that people will be deeply concerned over the issue of prayer in the public schools but will seldom utilize the opportunity to pray for schoolchildren in this way, against which there can be no law! –Richard Foster

Child Protection

If you were not aware, clearances are now to be renewed every **5 years**. The following is taken from a document from the Department of Human Services of PA: Beginning August 25, 2015, all volunteers will be required to obtain certifications every **60 months**. If an individual or agency, however, elects to renew all certifications at the same time, the date of the oldest certification, rather than the most recent, is the date to be used for the renewal date. http://keepkidssafe.pa.gov/cs/groups/webcontent/documents/document/C 135249.pdf

Fellowship Tour in Nigeria August 2016

Opportunities

- Listen to people's stories, build relationships
- Minister to the "most vulnerable" in God's kingdom
- Visit Care-Centers (including an Interfaith community)
- Provide children's activities at sponsored schools
- Peace and Reconciliation work (Alternatives to Violence Program)

"Zumunci a Kafa Take" is a Nigerian expression meaning "Fellowship is in the Feet." This tour would focus on "walking side-by-side" in support of the Nigerian people. Possibilities could include food distribution, assisting in medical clinics, offering children's activities, and visiting care-centers, although the primary focus would be building relationships and hearing stories. 


Congregational Collage for Annual Conference
