COB New Church Planting Conference Recap— Don Mitchell

"Hope, Imagination, Mission--the theme of the Church of the Brethren New Church Planting Conference, May 19-21 in Richmond, Indiana, hosted by Bethany Theological Seminary--prompted a new call to the whole church to develop its imagination and foster a new hope in the gospel of Jesus Christ. One hundred (100) people participated in worship, keynote presentations, workshops, and a special track in Spanish. The conference was sponsored by Congregational Life Ministries."

ANE continues "Going" as it shows we are embracing our theme and commitment to be an "All In" church. On May 18-21,

16 ANE members attended the aforementioned Church Planting Conference. Our "Going" group consisted of church leaders, pastors, Church Development Commission members, District Executive Craig Smith, and those sensing the Call from God to plant churches.

We met for intentional prayer, song, and praise in a pre-conference gathering on Wednesday evening, May 18 as people arrived and registered. This was to prepare people to get ready for what was to come; leadership was provided by Pastor Belita Mitchell, Harrisburg First Church, and Leah Hileman, Minister of Music, Harrisburg First.

Keynote Speakers for the conference were Efrem Smith and





The Palmyra CoB congregation made the decision in 2014 to stay in our current location and renovate. Location is an important part of who we are and the ministry that we want to do in our community. Coming to this decision created in us a need to meet the people that live around us. We began by hosting monthly cookouts in the parking lot--inviting our neighbors to join us for a hot dog or hamburger and to play a game of kickball or sit and chat in the shade.

After a summer of cookouts in the parking lot, we felt that there was more that we could do to engage those that live on and around Chestnut Street in Palmyra. Every year on trick or treat night, families traipse up and down Chestnut Street, walking past our building. This was a perfect opportunity for us to go out and join the community rather than asking them to join us.

Last October, for the second year in a row, members and friends of the Palmyra Church of the Brethren lined their vehicles up in the parking lot on Palmyra's community trick or treat night, trunks to the street. Each trunk was decked out in themes ranging from Mary Poppins to pirates to Jonah and the Whale. One family even set up a campsite complete with a fire pit and hot dog roasting! Those tending to the trunks were dressed in theme and passed out candy. As children and parents went door to door trick-or-treating down Chestnut Street, we were set up along their path.

In the weeks leading up to the event, groups and Individuals from the congregation had the opportunity to sign up to secure a parking spot on Trunk or Treat night. We also collected candy donations from the congregation to last us through the evening. Each year, we handed candy out to over 100 children and youth!

The Barnabas Fund Update

The Barnabas Fund Team met in early May to determine 2017 funding based on requests received from ANE district churches. Alpha & Omega, Brooklyn First, Germantown, and Harrisburg First were all offered funding for 2017 contingent upon approval from the ANE District Board and the ANE District Conference in October of the 2017 Ministry Investment Plan.

As those requests for funding were reviewed, there were some wonderful stories shared of kingdom work being done in our local churches. Here are two stories that were shared with the Barnabas Fund team by Jonathan Bream of the Brooklyn First congregation:

The Spanish Bible Study currently is using a series called "El Expositor Biblico: (The Bible Expositor), which consists of 13 lessons, focusing on the Great Biblical Teachings....Just this past winter, we lost one of the group's members to a long battle with cancer. At times, the Bible Study becomes a support group, seeking the Lord's answer to what are life's very complex problems.

Our Open Gym for Jesus continues to witness to unchurched youth from the street coming to know who Jesus is with Bible Study, snacks, and gym time. In 2015, we started to read through and study the Gospel of John. There are times we spend nearly half an hour understanding God's Word and answering questions. These young persons share prayer concerns. They pray for more than just good grades; they share deep family concerns. With guidance, they pray for each other, and they are seeing results. This group is diverse in age and heritage.

The Brooklyn First congregation is being supported by the ANE District Barnabas Fund with a \$25,000 annual commitment in 2016. This is just one more way that our ANE district congregations are able to work together to enable congregations with identifiable needs to more productively offer successful outreach and evangelism ministries in their communities.



ANE District Disaster Response Update

On Saturday, March 19, 2016, twenty ANE Congregational and Area Disaster Response Coordinators met at Lampeter C.O.B. for the ANE Disaster Response meeting and training. Kay Weaver, ANE Director of Stewardship, reviewed ANE's Disaster Response Trip structure and Trip finance guidelines.

Bob Eisemann, ANE District Trip Coordinator, reviewed Trip planning procedures and updated us on Brethren Disaster Ministries' site closings, new openings, and a new partnership in South Carolina.

Mary Etta, ANE Director of Witness & Outreach, reviewed our funding options for ANE's Disaster Response ministries. The Disaster Relief Auction granted ANE \$25,000 to help offset travel costs for ANE's disaster response trips through Brethren Disaster Ministries. The newly established ANE Disaster Benevolence Fund will provide additional funding for BDM trips, when necessary, as well as providing matching funds ANE congregations reaching out to individuals or families who have

been victims of disaster as defined in the Fund's guidelines.

Mary Etta also introduced ANE Witness & Outreach Commission's new Church2Church ministry. Following her explanation of this ministry, many attendees agreed to help with this ministry. For more information, contact the District office or Mary Etta at mreinhart@ane-cob.org.

The meeting ended with a good "Q&A Discussion" and lots of fun and fellowship as everyone shared their disaster response experiences and enjoyed the light refreshments provided by the District. We hope to see ALL congregational Disaster Response Coordinators in 2017!

Cancer Companions

ALL IN: Going. Glowing. Growing. Godly. This is our three year focus for our ANE District. This year we are specifically looking at GOING, and as we do that, I want to tell you about Cancer Companions.

Cancer Companions are individuals in congregations that have been trained to care for those in their very own congregations who are living with cancer. "Cancer Companions learn how to provide a safe place where you can talk about the things that concern you, worry you or infuriate you. More than a listening ear and an understanding heart, Cancer Companions bring the gifts of prayer, scriptures and devotionals to lift up families affected by cancer in their time of need. This is done through Christian cancer support groups and one-to-one peer counseling." -Cancer Companions website

The article below shares how Cancer Companions has personally affected both the life of Doris Abdullah and those she ministers to. Doris is a licensed minister and Cancer Companion from the Brooklyn First CoB.

cancercompanions bringing hope

It has been said by theologians that "the people of God do not go to church; they are the Church."

I agonized over what to say to Sister Maria upon first seeing her in hospital after her cancer surgery in November of 2013. All the way to the hospital, I went over words or prayers that I could use in speaking with her and her family members. With the Cancer Companion program my anxieties were stripped away and replaced with wonderfully new and refreshing tools to steer cancer patients, caretakers and family members towards "God is bigger than----" (fill in the blank) has become part of my vocabulary not only when encountering those with cancer, but in other seemingly overwhelming life situations. Becoming a cancer companion allows one to continue living out the service side of Brethren worship.

The scriptures used and accompanying readings are packed with new inventive present day stories telling on topics such as 'Barriers for Prayer, You Can't Fix Them," and the most often used question My favorite reading comes in the final of "Why Am I Sick". Scriptures, prayers, the offer of a safe environment to share and the act of listening were at the top of my tools list used in the cancer journey with Sister Maria. I was able to tell from listening what concerned her and what she needed or wanted from our visits. She had a son in prison that she had not seen since her surgery. As a Cancer Companion I did not have the day to day chores of a family member or caretaker. Thus I had time to find out how to make arrangements for her son to visit her before she lost consciousness. A cancer companion can offer a communion to the journey ceremony, not just bread and cup, as a fellow Deacon and I did one afternoon with Sister Maria. At the

small ceremony, she was able to share her faith with others that were present. So intimacy Jess Ross and small settings play a large role in being a companion.

seeing "God in the cancer journey". And A Cancer Companion travels the journey with those suffering with cancer and their family and friends. They use the tools that I have already listed and in addition the companion is always mindful of and respect the patients privacy as they give a hug, offer of a shoulder to cry on, a cup or glass to quench thirst and a short retreat from the sterile hospital setting. Flexibility is needed in being a cancer companion, because hospital visits and other medical issue are erratic and untimely.

> ceremony listed in the guide titled: Victory Celebration!!! It is my favorite because it lists the physical and spiritual battles already conquered by Christ in our life. Most of all it reminds me of the Apostle Paul 1 Corinthians 15 verses on the resurrection body:

> 'Death has been swallowed up in victory. Where, O death, is your victory?"

Sister Maria died on December 7th, 2015 with all her children present, including the incarcerated son.
