ANE District Executive, Craig Smith Announces Retirement

Atlantic Northeast District **Executive Craig Smith** has announced his retirement, effective December 31. While full duties as District Executive will conclude at the end of the year, Craig will serve a semi-sabbatical through March 31, 2017, consulting with district staff, and working with the transition team to assist the district with a smooth leadership transition.

Craig has served as
District Executive for 19
years. An emphasis on
new church planting and
the welcoming of
ethnically diverse
congregations into the
District has marked
Craig's tenure. He has
encouraged support for
international mission
efforts of the
denomination as well, in

cooperation with the variety of mission-minded Brethren groups present in our District. Craig has also been a leader in the Council of District Executives.

Under Craig's leadership, district staff has grown significantly. The district started a new staffing model in 2003 to call out and employ gift-based and passion-driven Ministry Directors. The district staff now number 8 people, including Craig.

In his retirement letter,
Craig said, "I come to this
season of life with a
mixture of sadness, joy,
expectation, and
profound thankfulness. It
has been (and is) my
distinct pleasure to have
served as District
Executive in the most
varied, ethnically rich,
geographically

wide-ranging, theologically diverse, and volunteer blessed districts in the entire Church of the Brethren. My 19 years among you has enriched my life and ministry immeasurably."

"I know I speak for all my brothers and sisters in the district and denomination when I say how grateful I am for Craig's commitment to Christ and all the ways he has faithfully served the Church for so many years," Pete Kontra, District Board Chair, stated in a letter. "And so for that we give praise to God, yet will most certainly miss Craig's presence and leadership. I ask you to join with me in praying for Craig and Vicki during this time of transition in their lives as we express our love and support for them in the days ahead."





Mountville COB Has Heard the Call, and is GOING! By Marian Bollinger

To a personal care home in Mountville to minister to residents each month. We plan a time of devotions, a time for conversation with them while sitting around tables, some entertainment, and we end the evening by serving the residents a homemade dessert.

To a homeless shelter in Columbia, PA: taking an evening meal and providing adult supervision through the night.

To wherever disaster strikes. In March, our church assembled 300 hygiene kits for CWS. The kits go to areas of the US or around the world; wherever brothers and sisters are lacking basic personal care items such as a hand towel, wash cloth, soap, comb, tooth brush, nail clippers, or band aids.

To North Carolina to volunteer a week of time with Brethren Disaster Ministries, building and painting after a natural calamity. We also packed 15 clean up buckets to send with the volunteers who go to these work sites.

To where children living in poverty lack basic school supplies. After cutting and sewing 300 bags, we filled them with school supplies, and our children laid hands on them as our pastor dedicated them with a prayer that each bag would make a difference in a child's life.

To Nigeria where children are traumatized. This year, we sent 20 handsewn dolls to EYN, the COB in Nigeria, healing sessions for children. Our children laid hands on the dolls, and we prayed that these dolls would bring hope to those in Nigeria.

We at Mountville, only wish we could help more because the needs are so great. The list of organizations that call on us for financial help gets longer each year. Unfortunately, we can't go everywhere, and we can't support every organization that is doing "good", because we have limited time and limited resources. So we must be selective. We choose to financially support the ministries of the ANE District, and also those of the Denomination. We support Alpha & Omega Community Center in Lancaster, Brethren Housing Association in Harrisburg, Brethren Village, Camp Swatara, COBYS, Global Food Crisis Fun, Haiti Medical Clinics and the Nigeria Crisis Fund.

These trustworthy groups are depending on us, and at Mountville, we want to be a part of the advancing their work. Won't you join us in supporting the ANE District and its many life giving ministries? When we work together for the glory of God and our neighbors' good, it's amazing what we can accomplish.

Barnabas Fund Update: Germantown

The Barnabas Fund Team met in early May to determine 2017 funding, based on requests received from ANE district churches. Alpha & Omega, Brooklyn First, Germantown, and Harrisburg First were all offered funding for 2017 contingent upon approval of the 2017 Ministry Investment Plan from the ANE District Board and the upcoming ANE District Conference.

As those requests for funding were reviewed, we were able to learn more about the outreach ministries of our urban congregations. For example, the R.I.S.E. reading program is an important part of the outreach ministry of the Germantown Church of the Brethren. Pastor Richard Kyerematen has shared the following

information with us about this exciting community outreach ministry of this congregation: "The Reading Incentives for Supplemental Education (R.I.S.E.) program is a collaborative, communitybased reading skills development program offered in partnership currently with the Emlen and Albert Gideon Elementary Schools and Education Works—a nationally recognized afterschool services provider. The mission of the R.I.S.E. program is to help children and their families build and measurably improve their reading and language arts competencies and apply those skills to other subject area and general life activities."

A brochure for this program includes the

following comments: "I loved the silent reading time and writing scripts for our own commercials. I also liked that we didn't just read. We did a lot of fun activities." - 4th grade student




