as our Interim District Executive beginning March 1, 2017.

A Manchester College and Bethany Theological Seminary graduate, Randy has been a faithful minister in the Church of the Brethren for over 50 years. He has served as a Pastor, a professor, a Director of a denominational agency and most relevant for this call, a District Executive with the Middle PA District for 20 of those years and an Interim District

Executive for Pacific Southwest District in 2009. The District Executive Committee prayerfully considered his profile, and after an interview, which felt more like a good conversation, it became clear to extend the call to Randy.

Southern PA District Challenge

Imagine! A brand new church building to seat at least 100 people! And a congregation ready to move in! Can we raise the funds? YES!

In the East Central African (Great Lakes Region) countries of Rwanda and Democratic Republic of Congo are emerging church groups identifying with the Church of the Brethren. Churches that Marla Abe (co-pastor Carlisle CoB) and Chris Elliott (pastor Knobsville CoB) were privileged to visit in Feb/March 2016. The Lord willing, they, along with Galen Hackman (interim pastor Florin CoB), will return in February 2017 for further seminars on Brethren beliefs and practices.

There are two congregations in Rwanda—one in Gisenyi, a small city, the other in Gasiza, a country church. Both are in need of buildings. The local culture give a congregation legitimacy when there is actually a building present. Otherwise, they are considered a “quick operation” in which someone declares himself a pastor and takes the money. At present, the Gisenyi CoB is renting a building (\$400/month), requiring most of their offerings to pay the rent. They own a small plot of land for future building.

The Gasiza CoB is meeting outside under a tree. The platform is a porch from a decaying building. The rainy season will keep them from meeting. Land has been purchased for a new church building, where they had hoped to construct a simple mud building. Unfortunately, that is not permitted as it is located in an active volcano area. So they will

need to purchase baked bricks or cement blocks. This church is thriving, with many children attending. Fourteen new people came to Christ there this month!

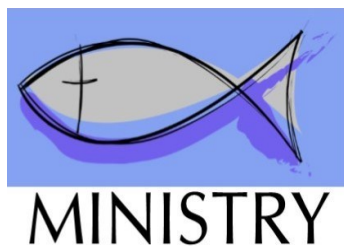
The Gasiza building will cost around \$26,000 to build. Our goal is to raise that much by the end of December. The Southern PA District Conference offering was over \$2,000, giving a great start. Part of the plan is to not tell our fellow Brethren in Rwanda of this gift of a new building. We want to surprise them with the funds when we visit in 2017. Can you imagine the joy and the glory given to God? Wow!

These churches are very evangelistic and outreach oriented. They have various projects and preaching points to share the Gospel and help the disadvantaged. Your support for the Gasiza church building, or any of the needs listed for the emerging denomination in Rwanda and DR Congo may be part of your budget, your Sunday School class giving, or a fundraiser. You may also give as an individual. You might give the money in lieu of Christmas presents. Have fun! Be like God and show grace and generosity!

Needs of the emerging denomination in Rwanda & Congo:

- Two church buildings in Rwanda—\$26,000 each
- Cement for floor of church building in Ngovi, DR Congo—\$1,700
- Cows for pastors, who are self-supporting—17 pastors, 3 cows given so far—\$500 ea.
- Education for pastors' children. At least 20 plus, \$400/year which includes three semesters, uniforms, school supplies and shoes. Can be sent \$100 every three months.
- Goats or sheep for widows—\$35 each
- Clothing or shoes for pygmy tribes—\$200/batch
- Plastic chairs for church buildings—\$10 each—hundreds needed
- Solar lights where there is no electronic—\$25 each
- Solar chargers—\$100 and up
- Soccer balls for youth/young adult ministry—\$10 each
- Pumps for soccer balls—3 for \$15
- Rada knife sharpener—\$7 each
- Lapel pins with towel and basin—\$4 from Brethren Press

Outreach Update

God's Squad is described as a team of people working for God. We invite the children to come learn more about our Squad Chief, God. The Headquarters & host for this ministry is **Chiques Church of the Brethren**. Our vision for God's Squad is that would strengthen our church and community by meeting the needs of our children through spiritual & physical refreshment.

God's Squad is a mid-week, evening program for children

Kindergarten through 5th grade. This program runs bi-weekly from October to March. Each week, the attendance is approximately 50 children, both from our congregation as well as from the community. Each age group has a teacher & a helper. Students go to their assigned classroom when they arrive at 6:45.

Throughout the evening, they are taught a bible lesson, have gym

evenings throughout the year.

We also host a special guest for the children (& their families, should they want to attend). Some of our favorites over the years include a reptile presentation, a ventriloquist, a puppet show, musical groups & a chalk talk. Each guest reinforces biblical principles we want the children to learn.

Everyone involved gets a free tee shirt to wear. Each grade is represented with a different color. The students are encouraged to wear them to school as a way to promote God's Squad & it builds a sense of comradery among the students.

During the summer months our church also holds Vacation Bible School & day camp for children, so God's Squad is a way to stay connected during the school year. Our prayer is that we touch lives & plant seeds of faith that will continue to grow.

Barnabas Fund Update: Harrisburg First

The Barnabas Fund Team met in early May to determine 2017 funding based on requests received from ANE district churches. Alpha & Omega, Brooklyn First, Germantown, and Harrisburg First were all offered funding for 2017 subject to the approval of the ANE District Ministry Investment Plan.

Harrisburg First will use the funds they receive to support the Agape-Satyagraha program (A-S) created and managed by bcmPEACE (Brethren Community Ministries), Harrisburg First Church of the Brethren's community outreach arm. We were told in their report that "the A-S program was developed to teach youth in grades 6-12 peaceful conflict resolution, negotiation mediation, and social change skills in order to reduce the number of conflicts that lead to an increasing level of often life-threatening violence on South Allison Hill in Harrisburg. Agape-Satyagraha combines Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr.'s Christian Agape (Unselfish Love) philosophy with the tactics of Mahatma Gandhi's Satyagraha' (Truth Force)." In this same report we were told that "violence, especially gun violence, is a pervasive presence

in the culture of South Allison Hill in Harrisburg and has become an almost expected response to interpersonal conflict among youth living on The Hill. In 2016 alone there have been five gun homicides as of this application date (May 2016) including one 5-day period in which there were seven shootings."

The Harrisburg First congregation will be supported by the ANE District Barnabas Fund with a \$15,000 annual commitment in 2017. This is just one more way that our ANE district congregations are able to work together to enable congregations with identifiable needs to more productively offer successful outreach and evangelism ministries in their communities.





ANE District Disaster Response Report

Have you ever considered spending a week (or more) of your time putting your faith into action by helping those who have suffered significant loss due to a natural disaster? Have you ever wondered how active people find time to step away from their busy schedules to reach out to those in need of a helping hand?

In spite of many commitments and busy schedules, volunteers from all over our ANE District have once again been actively involved in “putting their faith into action” at Brethren Disaster Ministry work sites this year. According to the BDM website “Brethren Disaster Ministries’ Rebuild Program engages volunteers to repair and rebuild storm damaged homes for some of the most vulnerable disaster survivors, thereby easing trauma and promoting recovery. By demonstrating Christ’s love and putting their faith in action as they restore damaged homes, volunteers also restore broken lives.”*

This year, there were 174 volunteer responses from the ANE District who served at one of 4 different BDM work sites for a total of 21 weeks. Volunteers served 8 different weeks in Loveland, Colorado, where major flooding occurred in September 2013 after 20 inches of rain fell, causing five major rivers to become raging torrents of destruction. Volun-

teers served 5 different weeks in Columbia, South Carolina where severe flooding occurred in October 2015 after 17 inches of rain fell in five days. In addition, volunteers served 7 different weeks in Detroit Michigan where basements were flooded after heavy rains in August 2014 overwhelmed many drain systems causing the sewers to back up into the basements of over 129,000 homes. In addition, one volunteer served several weeks at a BDM work site in West Virginia.

Did you know that the ANE District coordinates funding of the travel costs of these volunteers as they travel to and from the BDM work sites? Thanks to the generous support of the Brethren Disaster Relief Auction and thanks to generous support of the ANE Disaster Benevolence Fund, ANE District volunteers, who find the time in the busy calendars to volunteer with BDM, are able to travel to these BDM work sites at no cost to themselves.

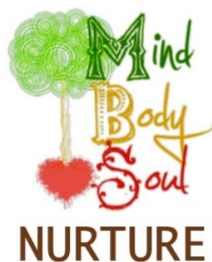
In Memoriam

Islam is the fastest growing religion in the US, and this event is designed to introduce our American Muslim neighbors so that we might begin to love them as Jesus commanded. The presenter, George Pickens, has been teaching Islam and Christian witness among Muslims for over 25 years, first in Africa where he spent 14 years, and currently at Messiah College, where he is Professor of Theology and Director of the Program in Peace and Conflict Studies. 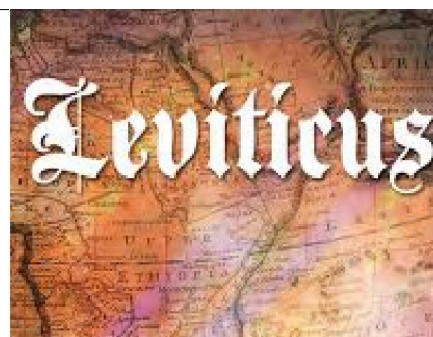

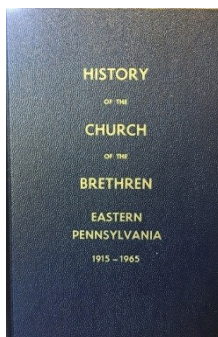
