Former ANE District Executive Allen Hansell Passes

Dr. Allen Thomas Hansell, Sr. passed away on May 10, 2017, following a battle with cancer. Allen was married to Lois Carper Hansell for 56 years until her death on December 27, 2015. Allen celebrated his 80th birthday on November 25, 2016.

Allen graduated from Bridgewater College, Bridgewater, VA in 1964 with a B.A. degree in Philosophy and Religion. He obtained his Master's of Divinity degree in 1967 from Bethany Theological Seminary and finally a Doctor of Ministry degree in 1983 from the same institution.

Allen served as a Pastor for 25 years in DE, PA and MD. His years of pastoral ministry were followed by nine years as the Executive of the Atlantic Northeast District Church of the Brethren, and four years as the denomination's Director of Ministry. He retired in 2006 as the Director of Church Relations at Elizabethtown College, although he remained as a member of the Board of Trustees until his passing.

At the time of his death, he had completed several successful years



as a member of the campaign committee of Elizabethtown College's Young Center for Anabaptist and Pietist Studies, an effort that was very dear to his heart.

Beyond the City Limits: Recap of the May 6 Conference

Over seventy people gathered at Lancaster Church of the Brethren to learn more about how to expand their ministry in spite of their perceived limitations. The day was filled with times of worship and testimony, as well as, opportunities for fellowship and learning in a smaller workshop setting.

Chris Johnson, founder and lead pastor of Divine Unity Community Church based in Harrisonburg, VA shared words of encouragement reminding us that "Diversity is not assimilation, but appreciation." The story of Pentecost where the Holy Spirit enabled the early church to speak in many languages was an image used to remind those present of the diversity found in the early church. The Revelation 7 image of the great multitude that no one could count, from every nation, tribe, people and language, standing before the throne and before the Lamb was another image shared of a church gathered in all its variety to worship the Heavenly Father. In spite of the differences and variety of gifts and abilities of those in our communities, we are challenged to reach out to

all to share the Gospel message.

Five different workshops led by Cherelle Johnson, Brian Messler, Belita Mitchell, Joel Pena, and Ron Tilley gave participants the ability to focus on some of the challenges facing our congregations today. Workshop topics included topics like LOVE (Your City Here), Reverse Service Evangelism, Dismantling Barriers and Building Bridges, Ministering to the Well Women, and Urban Latino Ministry Challenges & Outcomes.

Worship teams from Ephrata, Harrisburg First, and Alpha & Omega added an air of praise and worship to the day. Testimonies of God at work were shared by Leonor Ochoa of Lirio De Los Valles, and David Samaan of Light of the Gospel, as well as, a member of Alpha and Omega.

It was a rewarding day filled with challenge and encouragement!

Stories from ANE Disaster Response

What inspires you to keep on volunteering year after year with BDM? That was the question I asked Steve Keim, our Project Director Friday night as we debriefed the week's activities. His answer boiled down to one thing: the joy of helping others.

In April, a group of 15 from White Oak CoB spent a week working at the Columbia, SC site. Most of us were return volunteers who were looking forward to helping folks repair or rebuild their homes after flooding rains in Oct. 2015.

Our team was building a new 1,000 sq.ft. home for Elease, who woke up to knee deep water in her home. Can you imagine the shock and dismay of such a soggy mess? She was very thankful for all the volunteers who came from far and near to help her. Hopefully by mid summer she can move into her new home.

It is so neat to see how God provides just the right people at the right time. We had 2 career carpenters on our team who did a great job leading the rest of us in framing, sheeting and roofing that new house! I am NOT a

carpenter - I have been a domestic engineer for 32 years (homemaker and mother of 5), who does better cooking a meal than building a house. But the guys had faith in me and taught me to use the compound miter saw!! They gave me the measurements, and I kept them supplied with the 2x4's and 2x6's that they needed to frame the interior walls. I enjoyed the challenge and realized again that God doesn't always call the equipped, but He does always equip those that He calls.

We enjoyed working with Johnny Williams and his local group of volunteers with DERM (Disaster Emergency Relief Ministries) from the First Nazarene Baptist Church in Columbia. He had a few men each

day who diligently helped us. On Friday, he scheduled a large group of about 25 Navy recruiters to assist in the work. It took some planning to keep everyone busy. About half of them went down the road to another BDM rebuild house and put in insulation, while the rest helped with sheeting on our roof.

Despite tornado warnings on Monday and Wednesday, and some heavy rain, we felt like we got a lot done! Our group had comfortable accomoda-

> tions at the Woods Edge and enjoyed the food, fun and fellowship we shared together for the week.

My husband, Kervin and I have gone on 8 BDM trips now and would recommend them to anyone who is willing to work and learn new skills

while serving others.

Quoting from a devotional: "You encourage by what you say, but you inspire by what you do. Who can you inspire to-

day? Your words are important, but your actions add inspiration to your encouragement!"

Our team consisted of Ira Fahnestock, Mark Lowe, Matt Zimmerman and myself. Our project was to repair a trailer that was home to three autistic daughters. We removed rotted flooring and replaced floor joists as needed. New laminate flooring was installed over repaired floors in two rooms. We replaced damaged drywall, finished and painted three rooms.

We also installed flashing between the trailer and a porch, to keep rainwater from coming in around a window and the front door. We replaced one

window that couldn't be repaired.

The first week of April was stormy in South Carolina and we had to evacuate one afternoon because of a tornado warning.

The best part of the week was the fellowship back at camp after a day of working!

<u>Site 1</u>—Miss Earthia told us that she was named for the late entertainer Eartha Kitt who was born in SC (she added the "i" for differentiation). Her home was an interesting split level on a hilly lot. The small semi-finished basement was flooded nearly 18 months ago. When we arrived it had been cleared and sanitized and the initial reconstruction begun. Furring strips were nailed to the concrete walls and some basic framing was done to repair the ceiling and re-enclose ductwork damaged by the moisture.

Our team's task was to complete the finish work. Doug did some minor electrical and HVAC repairs. Dale and Marv did a marvelous job fitting paneling and the associated trim. They were wizards at making the limited supplies look fabulous. Jim and I focused on spackling, sanding and painting. What wasn't paneled received a fresh coat of paint, including the floor.

Miss Earthia was incredibly grateful for the work we did for her and came out to lead us in very moving prayer before we departed. We had an exciting return trip to our quarters that included enormous and incredibly close lightning strikes! We had to unload rapidly in the rain – and we came to regret our haste later.

Site 2 – Miss Ola's home was another house on a hill. We were again remediating flood damage – this time an attached garage that was converted to a family room. Again we were the finishing crew. Inside we laid a new vinyl floor, chipped and caulked cracks between the floor and walls. Outside we re-directed a downspout and created a swale in the yard to



redirect runoff away from the back wall of the family room.

The finishing touches included having Miss Ola come down and direct the re-placement of her furnishings. The team displayed a marvelous attention to detail, great kindness and abundant patience while the positioning of articles was fine-tuned! She was very pleased and extremely grateful in the end.

<u>Site 3</u> – This site was the most challenging for the owners. The home has no functioning water or electricity. In spite of all this Miss DeCarlo was quite cheerful and enjoyed introducing us to her daughter and grandson who arrived during our visit.

BDM is initially attempting to get water service restored. Several faucets in the house were too leaky to restore water service so repairs were needed. God often puts us at the right place when needed - Doug is a plumber by trade.

Doug and I went to this site while Dale, Jim and Marv finished the trim at Miss Ola's. While I handed tools and did outside work Doug "low crawled" about 30 yards around HVAC ducts in the crawl space under the house to find the connection to a fully failed outside faucet. In the end the best we could do was to cut it off and cap it. But this was a good first step to sealing off the water system.

Doug worked alone after lunch to successfully replace the shower valve cores that had also completely failed. Unfortunately we will not see the completion of this project.

Outreach Update: Springfield CoB

I was looking for a way to earn a little extra income, when I came upon an ad for a "Master Artist." I



didn't really know what that was. Rembrandt is a master artist, not me, but it had artist, and I love to make art, so I decided to investigate. It turns out the listing was for a paint party service. As part of the application process, I had to be a participant in a paint party. I had a great time but I also had a thought. I could do this myself. So I bought some easels and supplies. I started to do a few paint parties for camps and nursing homes. I found it was fun. One of my life


missions is to help people embrace their creativity and this seemed like a great way to do it.

Fast forward, I accepted the call to be pastor at Springfield COB. I wondered how a paint party would work as an outreach/fellowship opportunity for the church. We decided to try one and we were so pleased with the results that we have been doing them ever since!

I start by coming up with a simple painting that I can teach others to paint in approximately 60-90 minutes. The event is publicized to the church, including flyers they can hand out to their friends featuring the







brushes and paint for each participant

The event itself lasts two hours. I start off with a few rules. Most of these are humorous, just to remind the people that we are there to have a good time and to set their minds at ease. Then I teach the painting step by step. About half way into the party, we take a short break to talk, look at each other's work and let the paint dry. We did the first one as a free event. Since then we started charging a small amount to cover materials (less than a third of what the commercial painting parties charge). The people also bring snacks which are shared throughout the night.

I find everyone ends up laughing together and having a great time. It's a great way to build community. There's no high pressure evangelism with this event. I usually just plan on painting in my service the following Sunday. We invite the people to come and see what I do. We've had a few people take us up on that. It seems everyone who attends a paint party, returns and many bring a friend with them. This has been a great way to get to know people and open doors to the church. It's also a great way to empower a creative person in your congregation and give them an opportunity to serve the Lord with their gift.

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Recognizing and Reporting Child Abuse Training

On May 13th, I attended a session, "Recognizing and Reporting Child Abuse," held at the Ephrata Church of the Brethren and sponsored by

Atlantic Northeast District. Our presenter was from Pennsylvania Family Support Alliance, an organization selected by the Department of Welfare to provide mandated training for education,

community service, early education and religious professionals.

The presentation focused on elements of child abuse, legal definitions and an excellent

overview of mandated reporting obligations. Our ministry with children includes advocacy and this training provided updated forms

> and helpful information related to the reporting of suspected child abuse. Every church volunteer working with children is a mandated reporter and should be aware of Pennsylvania's "Childline," a

hotline used to make a verbal report of suspected abuse. Pennsylvania law also provides for serious penalties, including prison time, for failure to report.

The Barnabas Fund

PURPOSE

From the Early Church on, church bodies have sought ways to contribute to the needs of the whole church. This is no less true today. The **Barnabas Fund** has been established to share the blessing of financial resources with congregations who express a ministry-driven need. The name Barnabas Fund has been chosen to represent the concept of financial encouragement for congregations who need a fiscal boost to accomplish their God-calling in ministry. The Barnabas Fund seeks to encourage the ministry of congregations through a grant-based ministry investment strategy that seeks Kingdom-based ministry results through: shared resources, fiscal accountability, ministry planning, and economic partnering.

The Barnabas Fund provides continued support to ANE's four "mission congregations":

- Alpha & Omega (Lancaster, PA)
- Brooklyn First (Brooklyn, NY)
- Germantown (Philadelphia, PA)
- Harrisburg First (Harrisburg, PA)

Consideration will also be given to congregations whose characteristics include:

- A verifiable active outreach ministry
- Located in and serving a community with a significant economically challenged population
- Limited resources due to circumstances beyond their control
- Sizeable community needs that surpass the congregation's ability to respond

Barnabas Fund Eligibility

- Clear evidence of the need for financial assistance, based on the financial conditions of the congregation and project ministry funding.
- Clear evidence of responsible stewardship with current and available finances.
- Clear evidence of both the potential for and active participation in congregational outreach (physical, spiritual, or evangelistic) efforts in the community.
- Notable efforts at reaching others in the community with the Word-and-Deed (life-transforming) grace and knowledge of Jesus Christ.

The Barnabas Fund shall not be used to:

- Compensate for poor stewardship practices
- Compensate for deferred maintenance
- Sustain an "inwardly" focused congregation seeking survival

All grants will be given good-faith consideration and are subject to:

- Discernment of the Barnabas Team
- The Fund's income
- The number and timing of overall requests

MINISTRY INVESTMENT PLAN (MIP) UPDATE:

As of 4/30/17 total congregational giving for the MIP was \$162,019.96 and our actual MIP expenses were \$203,167.98. Therefore, our YTD Income over Expenses is a shortfall of \$40,160.30.

Thirty-five percent (35%) of ANE congregations, fellowships, and projects have not yet contributed to our common district ministry. ANE expenses are incurred on a weekly basis. Please urge your congregation as a member of the ANE family to fiscally support these ministries on a monthly or quarterly basis.

PLEASE REMIND YOUR CONGREGATION: The undergirding of this District Ministry Investment Plan is made possible only through the generosity and financial support of ANE members and congregations. Think about this: If each member/attendee would give just \$1.06 per week, your congregation could meet ANE's Fair Share goal of \$55 per member to keep ANE ministries strong.
