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ANE District Conference Wrap Up Elizabethtown College * October 7, 2017

On the morning of October 7, 2017, the Atlantic Northeast District hosted the 48th annual District Conference in Elizabethtown, PA. For many, the day started in the early hours and perhaps for some, it was still dark. If you were lucky enough to literally drive through the darkness and into the light, you would have seen the most beautiful sunrise. The peaceful metaphor projected a sense of inspiration for the day.

At 7am, the Leffler Chapel lobby was bustling with energetic, enthusiastic and dedicated Christians. Friendly and helpful volunteers from the host church, Hanoverdale, were busy welcoming each guest and making sure everyone was well organized for the day. Fellowship abounded in the breakfast room, the Bible study, and inside the Chapel. Outreach was in action, as hundreds of clean up buckets and supplies were collected to help Church World Service.

As 60, out of 76, congregations gathered for the day, delegates, non-delegates, presenters, guests, staff and volunteers, all came together to be "Transformed Into His Image." Moderator Glenn Martin, welcomed everyone and began with prayer. As the gathering music started and the congregation began singing, the sun was shining brightly over Leffler Chapel. It was clear that God was in our midst!

Evaluations revealed that while the temperature inside the Chapel was cold, the atmosphere was warm. Perhaps the warmest feeling was when Brothers and Sisters from all over the ANE District gathered together in small groups for prayer, then renewed our Church of the Brethren covenantal sacred promise.

Business commenced and reports from Commissions and partner agencies were presented. The following are summarizing messages from each ANE Director and Moderator Glenn Martin:

Church Development & Evangelism Commission

"Last year, two of our ANE fellowships were down to a handful of members and worshippers, possibly facing closure: Lirio De Los Valles, in Lebanon and Renacer Leola, now Un Nuevo Renacer, worshiping in Mountville. Prayer, new leadership, vitality and faith has changed both churches and they are experiencing spiritual and numeric growth!"

Dear Past, thank you for your lessons. Dear Future, they are ready. Dear God, thank you for another chance.

Among its many responsibilities, the District Ministry Commission is responsible to manage all ministerial and credentialing matters for the District, among which include annual licensing renewals, credentialing interviews

and services, and pastoral installation services. Our District currently has 54 licensed ministers, 242 ordained ministers and 6 candidates pursuing licensed ministry. It is our joy to celebrate with all the ministry happenings in our District this year: 6 newly licensed ministers, 4 newly ordained ministers, and 6 newly placed pastors. "At District Conference, the Witness and Outreach Commission shared all the outreach opportunities that are available in our ANE District. This includes our ongoing ANE District Disaster Response efforts, which support the work of Brethren Disaster Ministries and our Church 2 Church "community building". This is a ministry outreach opportunity that allows churches, with needs, to partner with churches who are interested in a service project. Our ANE District also offers financial partnerships and support among ANE congregations, with our ANE District Disaster Benevolence Fund. This fund supports ANE congregations dealing with situations involving significant loss. We also have our ANE District Barnabas Fund, which supports and encourages ministry in our urban congregations."



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ANE District Delivers 455 Disaster Relief Clean Up Buckets to New Windsor

What a wonderful God we serve! In August, Church World Service announced the need for more Disaster Relief Clean Up Buckets in their warehouse at Brethren Disaster Ministries in New Windsor, MD. This request was prompted by hurricane Harvey's devastation of Houston, TX. Little did they know Irma, Jose, and Maria were on their way, as well as a devastating earthquake in Mexico.

Mountville CoB, whose outreach is to supply buckets on a regular basis, has been an essential key to coordinating a large initiative to put together clean up buckets in our District. Three congregations, Ephrata, Elizabethtown and Mountville agreed to be drop-off points for others in the District. Many smaller congregations delivered buckets to District Conference to be included in the delivery. Ephrata CoB reached out and volunteered to transport all the collected buckets to Brethren Disaster Ministries for Church World Service on October 10.

Elizabethtown Church of the Brethren, Annville Church of the Brethren along with Ephrata congregations had each put together 100 buckets for this delivery. At our District Conference on October 7, close to 100 more buckets were collected, along with hygiene kits, to be placed on the truck.

We are pleased that our fellow brothers and sisters in Christ have come together to assist Church World Service at this time.

Elizabethtown College: College Steeped in a Tradition of Non-Violence

(continued from previous issue)

In addition to pacifism and nonresistance, Anabaptism emphasized social justice based on the influence of Pietsists. The Pietism movement began in the late 17th century. Pietism emphasized a personal emotionally charged conversion experience. The evidence of a personal religious conversion was demonstrated through engaging in social justice. Pietism required nonconformity to the world by rejecting secular literature, abstaining from consuming tobacco and alcohol, forbidding gambling, dancing, and attending the theater or secular festivals/amusements.

This Pietist emphasis on servant leadership and social justice within the context of nonconformity extended to personal appearance regarding "plain dress." Plain clothing is a strong political statement as it has historic roots in rejecting military uniforms reflecting rank and accomplishment. Plain dress is an ideological statement symbolizing a belief in pacifism and nonresistance. Dressing plain means you are a member of a church which emphasizes humility, egalitarianism, and conformity to community.

Typically plain clothes for men means a dark suit with the lapels removed and this is called a standing collar "plain coat" sometimes accompanied by broad fall pants. Men wear a felt or straw hat, the size of the brim can indicate their leadership role in the church. Plain dressed men do not wear neckties.

A plain dressed woman's wardrobe is defined by what is called a "cape dress" often accompanied with an apron, worn even when not in the kitchen, and can symbolize her husband or father's leadership role in the church. Their hair is grown long, worn pinned up, and finished with what is called a "covering" which is a prayer veil and can be topped with a bonnet. Plain people do not wear cosmetics or jewelry.

A religious sect among the Anabaptists, Pietists, and Historic Peace Churches is The Church of the Brethren. This denomination originated at Schwarzenau, county of Wittgenstein, Germany. In 1708 a group of Pietists, led by Alexander Mack (1679-1735), heavily influenced by the Mennonites and Amish, distinguished themselves by insisting adult baptism be done through triple immersion. They also accompanied the observance of communion with a fellowship meal called the love feast. (To be continued....)

Our ANE District Disaster Coordinator, Bob Eisemann, has organized a clean-up bucket project for our ANE District. The Brethren Disaster Relief Auction has purchased buckets. Some of the items to fill the buckets will be also provided to persons participating in this project. This includes the dish detergent, laundry detergent, work gloves, dust masks, non-



latex gloves and duct tape to seal the lid. The remaining items will need to be gathered by your congregation or small group to complete the list.

After your group has filled your buckets, Bob Eisemann will arrange transportation from your location to the CWS warehouse in New Windsor, MD.

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Immigration Issues in the news...How can we help?

Immigration has been a significant news item in recent months. We have heard stories about persons affected by the proposed phasing out of the DACA act over the next several months. There are also concerns about persons living in the United States without proper documentation who fear for their safety if they were to be returned to their native country. Many of us in our local communities and congregations are aware of persons who are living among us in fear of their future. In fact, some congregations have chosen to reach out to a specific person or family to help them find solutions to their immigration concerns.



Did you know that the ANE District Disaster Benevolence Fund can be used to help congregations who desire to reach out to persons who need financial help in dealing with legal and other issues related to immigration concerns? The Scripture Focus of this fund reminds us:



Distribution of funds for the ANE Disaster Benevolence Fund is done in the spirit of Matthew 25, where Jesus commends those who unknowingly ministered to Him as they ministered to others: "I was hungry and you gave me food; I was thirsty and you gave me something to drink; I was a stranger and you welcomed me; I was naked and you gave me clothing; I was sick and you took care of me; I was in prison and you visited me." (Matthew 25:35-36).

One of the purposes of the fund is to "share financial resources with ANE Congregations who reach out to an individual or family who has experienced an unexpected significant loss of basic necessities." Our ANE District Witness and Outreach Commission recently affirmed that a person or family facing deportation could fall under this category of "significant loss of basic necessities."

If your congregation desires to help a person or family facing significant immigration issues but is finding that kind of financial help is stretching beyond the financial abilities of the congregation, please contact the ANE District Office or Mary

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Barnabas Fund in Action!

The Barnabas Fund Team met in early May to determine 2018 funding based on requests received from ANE district churches. Alpha & Omega, Brooklyn First, Germantown, and Harrisburg First were all offered funding for 2018 contingent upon approval from the ANE District Board and the ANE District Conference in October of the 2018 Ministry Investment Plan.

As those requests for funding were reviewed, there were many examples shared of the different kinds of ministry taking place in these urban congregations. For example, here are examples of the kind of work being done at Brooklyn First:

First Church has been active in reaching out to unchurched family members and reaching out to the community to the unchurched youth and adults. Over the years, some of these unchurched families have become active in worship, some have stepped up and have begun to participate in the life of the church.

The Spanish Bible Study currently is using series called "El Expositor Biblico" (The Bible Expositor), which consists of 13 lessons, focusing on the Great Biblical Teachings...In addition to the Bible Study, many meetings include a discussion on the needs, concerns, and everyday struggles of its participants. At times, the Bible Study becomes a support group, seeking the Lord's answer to what are life's very complex problems....

Our Open Gym for Jesus continues to witness unchurched youth from the street coming to know who Jesus is with Bible Study, snacks, gym time. In 2015, we started to read through and study the Gospel of John. There are times we spend nearly half an hour understanding God's Word and answering questions. These young share prayer concerns....

Young Adults continue to meet, albeit sporadically, and fellowship, and care for each other. The Young Adults sponsored the showing of the movie, God's Not Dead. Approximately 50 people attended the movie.....

As the community changes First Church attempts to fill the needs of the community. As we are in the process of converting the former Positive Place (an AIDS/HIV ministry room supervised by former pastor, Phill Carlos Archbold), First Church envisions expanding our meager food and clothing pantry into that area.

The Brooklyn First congregation is being supported by the District Barnabas Fund with a \$25,000 annual commitment in 2017. This is just one more way that our ANE District congregations are able to work together to enable congregations with identifiable needs to more productively offer successful outreach and evangelism ministries in their communities.

ANE staff celebrates and sincerely thanks the 58 congregations who have contributed volunteer time and finances year to date. Your generous gifts were invested in the following ministries to enable ANE congregations to do together what they cannot do separately and help each congregation carry out in better fashion their major functions.

Pastoral/Congregational Ministries...

Assist in credentialing pastors, and meet with ones who are in the discernment process of understanding God's call to the ministry within the Church of the Brethren. Year to date we have completed 7 pastoral placements and are working with 9 more search committee efforts. Also provide continuing education events, consultation services for pastors and lay leadership, financial aid for ministerial study, and fiscal support for Susquehanna Valley Ministry Center.

Stewardship Ministries...

Communicate the ANE Ministry story through our Ministry Investment Plan, The Parking Lot, ANE Today newsletter, Know Your Neighbor newsletter, and the <u>www.ane-cob.org</u>. In partnership with Everence, we plan and provide holistic stewardship education through our annual Stewardship University and Creating Congregational Cultures of Generosity workshops.

Nurture and Youth Ministries...

Provide encouragement and opportunities for Christian education within the ANE congregations. Advocate for the spiritual, emotional, physical and relational health and vitality of the district's congregations through educational and informational workshops, Women's Fellowship ministries, and many District youth events where more than 200 youth participated in a service project, Jr. High, and Sr. High retreats.

Witness and Outreach Ministries...

Encourage and network with congregations to proclaim the Gospel of Christ, through The Barnabas Fund, Disaster Benevolence Fund, Church2Church Ministry, and Urban Initiative workshop Beyond the City Limits. Also provide outreach programs and resources, funding for ANE volunteers participating in Disaster Response, and support for Family Life Centers and urban ministries in Harrisburg, Lancaster, New York, and Philadelphia.

Church Development and Evangelism Ministries...

Provide support from Seeds of Faith fund for planting and developing 7 fellowships and projects and the rebirth of 3 small, struggling congregations. We also provide Church Planting leadership resources and workshops.

General Operating and Administrative Ministries...

Covers costs for District insurance, auditors, accountants, treasurer, office building maintenance and utilities, Historical Committee, and dues for Annual Conference and PA Council of Churches.

Stories from ANE Disaster Response

Now is the time for your congregations to reserve a week to travel to a BDM work site to serve at a BDM rebuild project. Our ANE District has reserved weeks with BDM for our ANE congregations who wish to serve at BDM rebuild work sites in 2018. At this time BDM has two locations where they are working.

One location is in <u>Marion, South Carolina</u>. According to the BDM website:

Hurricane Matthew hit South Carolina in October 2016. Marion County was one of the hardest hit areas, as well as one of the poorest. During the Hurricane, the County experienced wind gusts of up to 60 mph and received 10-12 inches of rain, with some areas measuring as much as 17.8 inches. Residents in low lying areas were evacuated due to flooding, with over 100 residents moved by boat, bus or helicopter.

The other location is in **Eureka**, **Missouri**. According to the BDM website:

In December 2015, Winter Storm Goliath caused by a dangerous combination of heavy rain, snow and river flooding, set historic water level records across the state of Missouri.....This spring 2017 storms brought at least 10 inches of rain in 10 days causing over 250 roads to close under water, including a 57-mile stretch of Interstate 44. Hundreds of businesses and homes were damaged or destroyed, many of which had just recovered from the 2015 flooding.

While these are the current work locations, Brethren Disaster Ministries may choose to move to a different location during the course of 2018, depending upon the situation in other areas hit by recent storms and/or hurricanes. Congregations who sign up for a week of work may choose the BDM Disaster work site where they will serve.

Travel costs for ANE congregations who travel to BDM work sites under the coordination of our District Disaster Coordinator, Robert Eisemann, may be reimbursed by funds from the Brethren Disaster Relief Auction and the ANE Disaster Benevolence Fund. Following our week of Vacation Bible School, the day camp runs for six weeks. The first week starts with first graders and the last week ends with sixth graders. The children come from 9:00 am to 3:00 pm daily Monday thru Friday. This Summer we had 266 campers and where filled to capacity. The children experienced many fun-filled days with activity, laughter and learning.

Highlights of the program are:

The pond: a welcome relief on those hot days and the new red slide was a hit too. The extra bump in it gives the kids a little extra thrill as they travel down.


Ga-ga and 9 square: 2 of the most loved games at day camp. In fact it just wouldn't be day camp without them.

New steps: a wonderful addition, making it easy for campers and parents to travel back and forth from pavilion to church and we can even have two-way traffic on it. They are rock solid - no more swaying from side to side, which is great for adults but knowing kids probably doesn't make them as happy.

Many parents expressed their sincere thanks to this church for the day camp program. "How can the program be so good and yet free; nothing's free?" The answer is Chiques COB funds and staffs the program for the community. We have quality teachers, directors and staff who live out their faith by volunteering their time and energy to day camp. We have people willing to finance this ministry through the servant sale. We have people willing to cook, clean, repair, and drive for this ministry. Lastly we have, that which undergirds this ministry, people praying. Again



and again it is a witness to our community that "Jesus" is alive and well. Over the years it has been my hope and prayer that Biblical truth and Jesus are worked into all parts of the program, not just Bible class. I see this coming to fruition as I've witnessed this in craft, music and cooking classes and in the way the counselors interact and treat the campers.



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Bethany and EYN Form Educational Partnership

Bethany Theological Seminary and EkklesiyarYan'uwa a Nigeria (EYN, Church of the Brethren in Nigeria) have entered into an historic relationship, the first of its kind between the Seminary and a Church of the Brethren group outside the United States. At the 2016 Annual Conference, Bethany president Jeff Carter and EYN president Joel Billi signed a Memorandum of Understanding which outlined a new intercontinental online education program. Conceived as a way to facilitate theological study at Bethany for EYN members, the program is a joint effort between the Seminary and EYN.

The first graduate academic program at Bethany made available to EYN students through the partnership will be the Certificate of Achievement in Theological Studies (CATS), requiring one course each in biblical, historical, theological, ministry, and peace studies and one elective. To be eligible for study at Bethany, international students must pass the Test of English as a Foreign Language (TOEFL). To help students prepare for the TOEFL, Bethany is arranging the offering of an intensive English language course in the fall of 2017. Students are required to take this course and a study course for TOEFL testing. Global Perspectives on Scripture: 1 Corinthians, currently scheduled for January 2018.

Reflecting the importance of collaboration in this new partnership, this first course will be taught by both Dan Ulrich, Wieand Professor of



New Testament Studies at Bethany, and Pandang Yamsat, chief executive director of the Center for Value and Attitudinal Reawakening. A New Testament scholar, Yamsat recently retired from the faculty of the Theological College of Northern Nigeria. The two met at Bethany early in May to begin planning the course.

"I am especially delighted that Dr. Yamsat took time to visit Bethany during a brief personal visit to the United States and to begin planning for our January course," says Ulrich. "Our planning sessions were very productive: we were able to finalize the course objectives, outline the work needed to meet those objectives, and develop a rough schedule for each class session. We have developed a strong working relationship, and I am confident that we can model the kind of intercultural interpretation we hope our students will learn."

Key to the program's success will be a new technology center at the

Boulder Hill Compound in Jos, Nigeria, where EYN students will take all their classes online. Plans for the facility call for two large flat-panel screens and multiple cameras and microphones, similar to the technology now available in one of Bethany's classrooms. Students on campus at Bethany, students in Jos, and faculty in both locations will share the live classroom, able to see and hear each other in real time. Course content may also be offered through recorded class sessions, and faculty and students will communicate by e-mail and texts.

Construction began on the technology center in mid-July 2017. Documentation of the process is available on Bethany's website at <u>www.bethanyseminary.edu/</u> <u>eynpartner</u>. Click on View Gallery to see photos of the work progression.

While the center will belong to EYN, Bethany is assuming responsibility for raising funds to cover the construction cost of \$150,000.

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Bethany and EYN Form Educational Partnership (continued)

Mark Lancaster, Executive Director of institutional advancement, and Musa Mambula, Bethany's international scholar in residence, have taken the lead in this effort, meeting with Church of the Brethren members across the denomination to make them aware of this opportunity for involvement in an empowering mission with EYN. To date approximately \$136,000 has been raised. Due to the fluctuation of the Nigerian currency, at least \$16,000 is still needed to meet the original goal. An additional \$50,000 needs to be raised to cover the costs of desks, computers, an upgrade in the campus electrical system, the internet connection, and compensation for Nigerian professors to teach the intensive English course. Ongoing support for this bold adventure in faith is also needed as program costs will continue from year to year.

As the program develops, Bethany plans to offer accessible courses in theological and historical studies, ministry studies, and peace studies. Developed or adapted in conversation with Nigerian church leaders, these courses will be designed to encourage mutual learning on topics of interest to students in Nigeria as well as America. Courses will be offered in intensive formats so that students can complete them during a short stay in Jos.

It is hoped that this innovative program will create a pathway for more EYN students to enroll

as degree students and study on campus at Bethany. Courses taken for the CATS can be transferred directly into the master of divinity or master of arts program at Bethany. As EYN moves from a state of crisis to one of greater independence after enduring widespread violence

and destruction at the hands of Boko Haram, this educational partnership can help strengthen the leadership, mission, and ministry of a resilient and growing denomination.
