Message from Pete Kontra, District Executive

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Brothers and Sisters of the ANE District:

"Keep Thinking About Good Things"



Sisters Mary and Yamtikarya will join us for our celebration of 60 years of ordained ministry for women in the Church of the Brethren! They will attend the clergy women's breakfast on Friday morning and also will present an Insight Session through the Office of Ministry. It is our hope that this visit will provide many opportunities to build long and lasting friendships with our Nigerian sisters.

Included in their visit is the possibility of "extra-curricular" activities before and after conference, such as a visit to Bethany Theological Seminary, the offices in Elgin and a visit to Washington D.C. and advocacy work on "the Hill."

Disaster Response Update: Marion, South Carolina, February 4-9, 2018



This was the first time for us to go on a mission trip through BDM. We came from the ANE District (Lebanon Church of the Brethren and Schuylkill Church of the Brethren). Joining us were 13 others, including Old Order Mennonites from Wisconsin and a couple from Indiana. Ages ranged from 69 to 15 with many different skills. Our purpose was

to help rehabilitate 3 homes in Nichols, South Carolina that had been devastated by the flooded Little Pee Dee River after Hurricane Matthew in 2015.

We were housed in St. John's AME church in Marion, South Carolina. Our work consisted of painting, cleaning, and ripping out paneling. The day started at 6:00 AM with devotions, packing lunch and breakfast. We arrived at the work site, which was a half hour drive, about 8:00AM. After a lunch break at noon, we worked until 4:00PM, then returned to Marion. Evenings were for devotions, supper, review of our day's work, and fellowship.

During the week one of the family members of the house where we were working stopped by to inspect our progress. She and her mother are eager to return home and were very thankful for all the help from BDM.

We enjoyed our week helping those in need and making new friends from Wisconsin, Indiana, and South Carolina. We definitely would recommend this opportunity to everyone who has a wish to help others.

Pricetown: The Oldest Unaltered Brethren Meetinghouse

A gem of Brethren History exists in the small Berks County village of Pricetown, located on route 12 near its intersection with route 662. The village is named for Conrad Price, a Dunkard Brethren who emigrated there from Germany in 1754. The Pricetown Meetinghouse was constructed of fieldstone in 1777, only seven years after the first Brethren Meetinghouse in America was built in Germantown. It was built by Martin Gaube, who in 1807 turned over the deed to the "Old Baptist Society" (known as the Church of the Brethren since 1908). Gaube died in 1812 and is buried behind the Meetinghouse. It remains in pristine shape, due to the efforts of the Mohrsville Church of the Brethren.



The one-story structure (30 x 25 feet) features a kitchen extension (16 by 16 feet) to the right, probably added a very short time after the main structure was built. The Kitchen was likely used to prepare meals for Love Feast. There are benches for the congregational attendees, to which backs were added in 1877. There is no pulpit for the preacher. Dubbed "the oldest unaltered Brethren Meetinghouse in America," the building has not been modified from its original structure. Other than replacement of the roof and floorboards, it remains in its original state.

Brethren have not consistently worshipped here since 1777. The 1770 members of what was then known as



the Oley congregation were Martin Gaube (minister) and wife, John Yoder (minister) and wife, Conrad Price and wife, David Price and wife, David Kinsey and wife, Daniel Kleine and wife, Peter Kleine, Elizabeth Ellis, Margaret Harpine, and Catherine Plank. After a period of decline in membership, Samuel and Sara Fox moved to Pricetown in 1846 and began having services there.

Since 1930, there is only service a year. The next service is on June 3, 2018 at 2:30PM.

Elizabethtown College: College Steeped in a Tradition of Non-Violence

With the First World War looming and concerns about conscientious objection and options for alternative military service for Elizabethtown College students, on April 25, 1917 ownership of the college was assumed by the Church of The Brethren's General Education Board. For 75 years the college was legally owned, governed, and funded by the Church of the Brethren.

On December 3, 1992 a Mutual Expectations Committee produced a "Statement of Basic Understanding" establishing a covenant rather than legal relationship between the church and college. Accordingly the "church cannot and should not control the college, and the college cannot and should not expect the church to totally finance its operations and assume all of the legal responsibilities of ownership." On October 23, 1993 the Board of Trustees amended the

College's Articles of Incorporation, giving the board sole power to elect its mem-

bers.

All but the last three presidents of Elizabethtown College were ordained cleray in the Church of the Brethren and several were evangelists such as President Ralph W. Schlosser (1886-1978), class of 1907, who held 225 evanaelical revival meetings in the course of 55 years in over 10 states. Many of the presidents, deans, and faculty were alumni of the college.

Most of the students were right off the local farms in southeastern Pennsylvania, six of the past presidents could speak the Pennsylvania

German dialect fluently. Although Elizabethtown College is rooted in Anabaptism and strongly influenced by the local Pennsylvania Dutch culture, the institution has always been ecumenical.

In the original charter for the College it is clear the school was not established only for members of the Church of the Brethren but "shall be open to all such as desire to avail themselves of its privileges." According to a statement crafted by faculty and students appearing in 1904 in the school newspaper "... the doors are open to everybody, regardless of creed, and they are not to be intimidated on

account of their honest, religious convictions. While Elizabethtown College is loyal to its immediate fraternity, yet no one on account of his religious convictions, shall in any way be embarrassed while making his sojourn with us; but that he shall always feel at liberty to hold his honest religious convictions, even though they may in some degree be at variance with others."

One of the college's

benefactors, Mennonite Elmer Esbenshade (1881-1967) wrote in 1967 how he believed "every youth, regardless of race, creed, or color, ought to prepare themselves for life by securing an education that will qualify them for some worthwhile vocation." Adding how the world needs individuals who "will influence not only their own destiny, but also serve the interests and welfare of human kind."

> In 1967 a committee was appointed to review the purposes of the College. The committee issued the statement, "While the College does not expect that the total Faculty be Christian or reflect any one point of view, it does expect that the goals and the purposes of the institution will be respected by all Faculty." Consistent with this

history, Elizabethtown College offers a Bachelor of Arts dearee in Interfaith Leadership Studies.

Elizabethtown College is still firmly rooted in the Anabaptist and Pietist tradition within the context of the Historic Peace Churches.

The Elizabethtown College Alumni Peace Fellowship works closely with the College's Center for Global Understanding and Peacemaking. These two groups sponsor the Paul M. Grubb, Jr. (1932-1985) class of 1955 Student Peace Award; Eugene P. Clemens, Professor of Religion Emeritus, Student Peace, Tolerance, Social Justice Award; and the Mary Dilling Herr, class of 1957, Peace Fund.

The College's Center for Global Understanding and Peacemaking annually hosts the Ware Colloquium on Peace Making underwritten by Paul and Judy S. Ware class of 1968.

The College offers a minor in Anabaptist and Pietist Studies, as well as a minor in Peace and Conflict Studies. The College curriculum features classes such as "Anabaptist and Pietist Movements," "Amish, Brethren, and Mennonites in the U. S. Since 1875," "Amish Society;" "Peace, War, and Nonviolence;" "Peacemaking and Social Justice in the Bible."

The President of Elizabethtown College, European Historian Dr. Carl J. Strikwerda, a member of the Elizabethtown Church of the Brethren, regularly teaches the course "Peace and War in a Global World."

The College library is home to the Church of the Brethren Archives located in the Earl H. and Anita F. Hess, Class of 1953, Archives and Special Collections.

The Office of Church Relations is part of the Institutional Advancement division and is a bridge between the College and the Church of the Brethren's Atlantic Northeast and Southern Pennsylvania Districts. The College financial aid office features the Church of the Brethren Scholarship to students who are active members of the Church of the Brethren.

The campus hosts the Susquehanna Valley Ministry Center which was established in 1993 in collaboration with the Church of the Brethren Bethany Theological Seminary (1905), and the Brethren Academy for Ministerial Leadership.

The offices for a study abroad program called Brethren Colleges Abroad have been on campus since it was created in 1962.

In his inaugural address as the 11th president of the College, on November 5, 1977, The Reverend Dr. Mark C. Ebersole (1921-2011), class of 1943, said, "Through philosophy, history, legend, poetry, religion, and all other liberal studies, the human spirit is stirred to probe more deeply for the truths that make life worthwhile, for those values that will bring sublimity of purpose and character."

President Ebersole's words are echoed in the purpose of the college as described by the Board of Trustees in a statement issued in 1927, "...the ideals and purpose of the founders of the college... harmonious development of the intellectual, moral, physical, and spiritual life of the student."




