

Greetings ANE Ministers, Congregations, Board Chairs,

The District Ministry Commission (DMC) feels it is important to clarify the 'what now' as the result of the failed vote for the *Policy on Same Gender Marriage* at this year's District Conference.



The Policy on Same Gender Marriage was brought to District Conference, as recommended by the District Ministry

Commission and District Board, for approval. During the morning business session of District Conference, the delegates, upon the recommendation of the District Board, voted to require a 2/3 majority vote for this policy to pass.

An amendment to the policy was brought to the delegates for consideration, which passed by a majority vote. However, the newly amended *Policy on Same Gender Marriage* failed with a 56% vote.

This leaves the District with a variety of assumptions of what this action signifies. A couple important notes of clarification:

- The action taken at the 1992 ANE District Conference which states, "...in light of the Scriptures and the 1983 and 1992 actions of the Annual Conference in regard to homosexuality, we of the Atlantic Northeast District desire to support Christ-centered ministry which seeks to help people stop practicing homosexuality, and we will not support anything which promotes accepting the practice of homosexuality as a lifestyle that is approved by God", is still in effect.
- The action of the Policy on Same Gender Marriage indicates that the District
 Conference has not agreed to terminate a minister's ordination if he/she
 officiates a same gender marriage. However, ministers in the District and within the
 denomination are still not authorized to perform such unions. The action at District Conference did
 not give the 'okay' to perform same gender marriages.

Please be assured that the District Ministry Commission is continuing its work to develop a process on responding to ministers who may choose to perform same gender marriages. There is so much good God is doing through us! Let's be on our knees before Him that His Light shines bright to the world.

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District Conference Wrap Up Atlantic Northeast District Conference * Elizabethtown College * October 5-6, 2018

On the evening of October 5, 2018, the Atlantic Northeast District commenced the 49th District Conference with a Friday night worship service. Back by popular demand, an evening worship service was well attended by many ANE Brothers

and Sisters singing God's praises. The inspiring evening was full of music from SonLight Praise Team, a District-wide Choir, and a youth solo guitarist, who all helped to set the mood for a weekend full of prayer and praise.

Moderator Misty Wintsch, fulfilled a lifelong dream to preach at District Conference. Her uplifting and powerful message encouraged everyone to pray for one another, listen to each other and respect all opinions that might not agree with a personal perspective. Misty reminded the conference to "Think about Good Things", this year's District Conference theme.

The evening consisted of a celebration of District diversity, a fellowship expo with displays from related and

partner agencies, refreshments provided by Camp Swatara in celebration of 75 years, ACTS graduates were recognized, 50 year ministers were honored and an atmosphere of family and fellowship flourished.

On Saturday, record breaking numbers of delegates and non-delegates turned their focus to the business portion of District Conference. Before 7am, Leffler

Chapel was full of passionate Christians seeking to do God's will. A team of volunteers were on hand to assist with parking, greeting and registration. Fellowship abounded in the breakfast room and an insightful Bible study was led by Pastor Brian Berkey. Outreach was in action, as hundreds of supplies were collected for the children benefiting from COBYS Kids Closet. The collective group of volunteers from the host churches Jennersville, Mechanic Grove and Wilmington welcomed the ANE family as they arrived for the day.

At 8:15am, the conference began with lovely music, group prayer and a time to share. Soon afterwards the ANE District Commission Directors shared all of the good things that the District ministries have been doing over the past year with

their presentation of ANE Today.



Afterwards, the Compelling Vision Team gave a report to the body. At the 2017 Annual Conference, the delegate body affirmed a report from the Leadership Team and the Council of District Executives. That report concluded with the assertion "to stay on the journey together, it is also crucial that the church discern the compelling vision that this body of Christ is called to pursue." The Compelling Vision Working Group established a guiding

statement: "Confessing Jesus Christ as Teacher, Redeemer, and Lord, we desire to serve Him by proclaiming,

professing, and walking in His way together bringing His peace to our broken world. Join us in reclaiming a new passion for Christ and helping set a course for our future as the Church of the Brethren serving Him in our communities and in the world!"



District Conference Wrap Up (continued)

This statement of proclamation, intention, and invitation articulates the deep conviction of this group. Conference attendees were invited to participate in upcoming conversational meetings in November.

After the Compelling Vision report, a financial report was given by the ANE Treasurer, Ray Flagg. A 2019 District Ministry Investment Plan was presented and the delegates voted to approve the proposed budget for \$615,651 and the Fair Share Recommendation.

District Conference Wrap Up (continued)

The lunch break provided an enjoyable time for food and fellowship. Three "Lunch and Learn" insight sessions were offered and were well attended. They included: "Meet Pete" the ANE's new District Executive, "Hugging Porcupines" a nurturing youth session with Dave Coryell, and "The Young Center" a lesson and tour with Jeff Bach.

After lunch, the tone of conference turned more serious as delegates and non-delegates alike gave their full attention to the significant policies being presented. The delegate body affirmed Veritas for congregational status. An amendment was made to the Policy on Same Gender Marriage, however the final vote to adopt the policy was not affirmed. Additionally, the final vote on the Procedural Outline for Congregationa Withdrawal was not affirmed by the delegate body.



At the end of the day, there was a beautiful consecration and transfer of leadership from Misty Wintsch to Brian Berkey.
Next year, Brian

will lead the ANE District Conference with a focus on Job 29:2-3, "Living the Legacy". The verse says "How I long for the months gone by, for the days when God watched over me, when his lamps shone upon my head and by his light I walked through darkness!" (NIV) Brian said, "If ever there was a person who could really lament about the "good old days", it has to be Job.... In the 21st century church, as we become absorbed with all of the issues, all the "stuff" of the day, perhaps we, like Job, need to consider our Brethren legacy and where we are in our relationship with God. To follow up on the 2018 District Conference theme, perhaps it is time to focus on those things in our heritage that are good and positive, the important things that we have in common and less on the "stuff" that may cause division."

The evaluations revealed that many at District Conference appreciated the Friday night worship service, singing Brethren hymns together, the Moderator's excellent leadership and the overall sense of respect for one another during these challenging and controversial times. 68 out of the 77 ANE congregations came together on a beautiful fall weekend to celebrate the Philippians 4:8 theme of all that is true, noble, right, pure, lovely, admirable, excellent and praiseworthy within the ANE District.





Disaster Relief: St. Thomas

Doing disaster relief is one of my favorite things to do for several reasons. One is helping those that are in need and do not have the means to rebuild their houses. Another is the social aspect of it all. What I mean by that is the relationship building that goes on when many come together to meet a common goal. From the church groups to the Disaster Organizations, to the homeowners themselves. All are bound in this unique community of rehabilitation and healing.

I had volunteered with Brethren Disaster Ministries through the Brethren Volunteer Service a few years



ago. It kindled my passion for disaster relief that stills lives on today. When I saw BDM sponsoring weeks in the St. Thomas, I jumped at

the chance to help. St. Thomas had a double hit in 2017. Not one, but two, hurricanes ravaged the Virgin Islands in a ten-day span, leaving scars that are still seen and felt a year later.

Besides myself, there were eight others that made the trek to St. Thomas. Few of us knew each other, but by the end of the two weeks, we had built a mutual camaraderie. We stayed in housing owned by a local Episcopal church that had one bedroom and bath for each gender. Centered in town, the housing location was perfect for us to experience local life after work. Every weekday we would travel to meet with the

organization named My Brother's Workshop that would tell us what job to do that day. For the two weeks I was there I helped make shutters, painted, re-



sealed a roof, and help put up those same shutters. It was exhausting work, especially when you add in the factor of the intense sun. Nevertheless, we persevered and got a lot accomplished.

What I take away the most from those two weeks is witnessing the sheer trauma the people of St.

Thomas still experience. I heard several accounts of the survivors reliving and struggling with those moments. The time I was there was the anniversary of the two hurricanes. On top of that, came a threat of another one hitting the island that set everyone on edge. On the weekend I attended a Moravian church, and the woman speaker talked about accepting that you need help in dealing with the ordeal.

In short, it was a tiring but enjoyable week. I learned new skills, reused old ones, and had a lot of fun. I would highly encourage anyone to volunteer with Brethren Disaster Ministries. No matter what your skills are, there is always work to be done. In truth, my biggest skill I used those two weeks were my listening ones.

Blooming in Rwanda

My flower garden in full bloom is a wonderful sight to see this time of year. The days are hot but the evenings are cooler, and each night dew forms on flower petals. When dawn breaks, bumblebees bounce about, as do hummingbirds, and the morning breeze blows through the garden. The droplets of dew on each plant roll off, falling to the ground and gently watering the roots of neighboring plants.

The ministry of Global Mission and Service functions in a similar fashion. As mission workers and international leaders care for their communities, they also receive care and encouragement. It is just as the Apostle Paul wrote when he hoped to visit the believers in Rome that they "might mutually encourage one another" (Romans 1:12).

Just a few weeks ago, the Ludwicks packed their bags and caught an Ethiopian Airlines flight to Kigali, Rwanda. This small family from the Harrisburg (Pa.) Church of the Brethren committed to serve as mission workers for a year with a newly established Brethren church community in western Rwanda. Their ministry will include many things, but first and foremost they will be led to new levels of trust—in God, their new Brethren community in Rwanda, and their home congregation.

The Church of the Brethren is just getting started in Rwanda. There are currently four small congregations: one in the city of Gisenyi and three in rural areas where a significant number of members attend from Batwa Pygmy community, the indigenous inhabitants of the equatorial forests of the Great Lakes Region of Africa. The Rwandan Brethren have a deep desire to reach out to this marginalized community and have even started a Batwa Pygmy choir.

For Christine and Josiah Ludwick, moving their children, Asher and Rachel, to a new country in the heart of Africa required much faith in Jesus. As they serve, they are also trusting that God, who called their family in this new direction, will supply all their needs according to his riches in Christ Jesus (Philippians 4:19).



The charge we have given the Ludwicks is simple but profoundly meaningful: be present, build relationships, and be mutually encouraged by the Brethren in Rwanda. Since Christine is a nurse practitioner and Josiah is a youth minister and skilled musician, they will teach, provide medical care, sing, and serve. In return, the Rwanda Brethren will teach the Ludwicks to function in a society that they do not know. This Includes finding housing and transportation, teaching them how to shop and cook, sharing advice, and providing support all along the way. The transition will be difficult, and the Ludwicks will surely have many questions, but their new Brethren community will bear with their newness and guide them into meaningful ministry. Together, they will offer the gospel of peace to those they encounter—something that is greatly needed in Rwanda at this time.

In addition to trusting in God and their new Brethren family in Rwanda, the Ludwicks are also trusting in their home congregation and in all of us of the Church of the Brethren in the United States. They are in great need of our prayers, encouragement, and financial support. Through your gifts to Global Mission and Service, the Ludwicks and other mission workers can continue to serve where God has called them.

As the Ludwicks and Rwandan Brethren serve in ministry together, they will mutually encourage one another and water the growth that is already started. Through trusting in God and one another, the blossoming ministry in Rwanda will become an ever more wonderful sight to see.

Hope to Homeless Through Family Promise By Jill Keyser Speicher

Two weeks of every year the Wyomissing Church of the Brethren near Reading, PA, transforms several of its Sunday School rooms into comfortable bedrooms to house several families seeking homes and jobs in Berks County. The program called Family Promise of Berks County is part of a nationwide program. In the



evening and overnight the families are hosted at the church, given a warm meal and offered support through listening. The church has a gymnasium for the children to play and an outside playground. During the day, the families are driven to the Family Promise Headquarters in Reading where they concentrate on job skills, financial counseling, and work on permanent housing stabilization.

The Wyomissing Church has hosted families with Family Promise for over ten years. When the church first became involved, it was teamed with Temple Oheb Shalom. After those initial years, the Wyomissing Church started to host the program on their own. The most recent coordinators have been Linda and Carl Voelker, who recruited and managed volunteers for nine years. When asked what impressed them most about their experience, they stated that it was the gratitude expressed by the participating families. Just this year, Paula McCutcheon became the new facilitator. When Paula heard the need for a new coordinator, she thought of the story of the Good Samaritan and the help of a stranger. Paula is glad that the Family Promise program provides a safety net for families in need. She was excited to welcome her



first group of families to the church and coordinated volunteers who shared their time and talents in many ways —providing a meal, serving and cleaning up after a meal, offering a listening presence, sleeping in the church as a chaperone, reading a story to a child, setting up and breaking down Sunday School rooms, and helping with laundry.

In Berks County there is much need for help to families in transitional circumstances. During 2017, Family Promise of Berks County enrolled 143 families, served 11,000 meals, provided 3,722 bed nights, and facilitated 14,248 volunteer hours, with the help of congregations throughout Berks County, including the Wyomissing Church of the Brethren. In 2017, Family Promise of Berks County successfully transitioned 85% of the families served into



permanent housing. Family Promise certainly makes a considerable difference for hundreds of families

experiencing homelessness in Berks County.

Christ calls us to continue to offer hope to homeless families in Berks County. The next week of service is set for November 4-11, 2018. 


