On October 4 and 5, 2019, we will again gather together at the Leffler Chapel as the Atlantic Northeast District. We will auther to worship and address the business of the church. This will be the 50th District Conference for ANE. 50 years ago, folks from what at the time were the Eastern District of Pennsylvania and the North Atlantic District gathered together at the Lititz church to unite and become the Atlantic Northeast District. In some ways things are much different today but in other ways, perhaps not so much. The participants 50 years ago faced a variety of issues in coming together. Bringing the message to the assembled people that day was Annual Conference Moderator, Harold Z Bomberger, who observed that: "the uniting districts brought a common loyalty to Christ and a common heritage as well as differences and diversities. To bring strength from these diversities will require keeping proper priorities in focus. As uniting districts we need to bring an openness to keep the mind of Christ and a sensitivity to one another and to others as a high priority if we are to stay together, to work together and to make a positive contribution to our fractured and bleeding world."

I believe that those words apply to us today just as much or perhaps even more, as they did 50 years ago. The theme for the 50th ANE District Conference is "Living the Legacy", based on Job 29:2-3—"How I long for the months gone by, for the days when God

watched over me, when his lamps shone upon my head and by his light I walked through darkness!" (NIV)

I think most of us would agree that if ever there was a person who could really lament about the "good old days", it has to be Job. In this passage of scripture, even in the midst of his anguish over what has befallen him, Job comes to the realization of what really was good about the good old days. What Job really misses is not all of the "stuff" that he had but his close relationship with God. In the 21st century church, as we become absorbed with all of the issues, all the "stuff" of the day, perhaps we, like Job, need to consider our Brethren legacy and where we are in our relationship with God. Harold Bomberger's words from that first conference apply very much today. To follow up on the 2018 District Conference theme, perhaps it is time to focus on those things in our heritage that are good and positive, the things on which we can build the future, the important things that we have in common and less on the "stuff" that may cause division.

As Brethren we may not study the Old Testament perhaps so much but as we enter into a new year with many challenges before us, I would really encourage us to take a look at Job. There are lessons that can be learned there about dealing with our struggles that apply in our world today.

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


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

BUCHER MEETINGHOUSE

The Tulpehocken Circuit of Brethren, a branch of the Conestoga (Lancaster County) Church which was spreading to Lebanon County, was growing rapidly in the mid 1800's. Prior to 1871, religious services for these members were held in their homes and barns. Henry Dohner donated an acre of land, and A. Wilhelm, Ezra Bucher and J.H. Bucher led a drive for funding which resulted in the construction of the Bucher Meetinghouse along route 419, the Schaefferstown Road, in Cornwall, PA.

The 40 by 60 foot white frame structure still stands today much like it did when constructed in 1871. It sits back from the road such that it is easily missed by the many drivers along route 419. It features a separate entrance for men and women, and simple wooden benches. It has been called the Cornwall or Bucher's Meetinghouse over the years, the latter name being a testimony to the many Buchers who preached or taught there.

The first Sunday School was held at the Bucher Meetinghouse in 1880. When the Midway Church of the Brethren was founded in 1902, it merged Brethren from two meetinghouses of what was then called the Tulpehocken Church: Midway and Cornwall.

The first Elder in Charge of Midway in 1902 was Christian Bucher. The Midway congregation went on to enlarge and build new facilities, but the Cornwall Meetinghouse was never enlarged and ceased to hold regular services in 1933. Some special services, including German language services, were held there for a few decades. It is maintained today by the Atlantic Northeast District.

Disaster Relief Updates: Lumberton, NC




In early September 2018, six of us from Palmyra COB headed to Lumberton, NC, to work with Brethren Disaster Ministries (BDM) reconstructing homes damaged 3 years earlier by Hurricane

Matthew. Along with about 15 other volunteers from Southern Ohio and Western PA, we spent a very hot week fixing drywall, busting up a damaged driveway and preparing it for new concrete, installing skirting under a mobile home, and salvaging usable bricks from the exterior of an unlivable home before demolishing it. A couple of us had significant construction skills, and the rest of us supported them as "go-fers."

I was part of the brick-salvaging work crew. We were able to meet

the homeowner, and she described the story behind why the bricks were important to her. When her father owned the house decades ago, he had salvaged them from somewhere and was so pleased to put them on the exterior of the home. Now that he was no longer living, the homeowner wanted to re-use some on the new home in his memory. Knowing the story of their significance made the work less difficult.



help rebuilding his home. While we weren't able to give that help, we could refer him to BDM and other local agencies, though we knew that the approval process for assistance can be daunting.



home. David's home was renovated in a cooperative effort between BDM and local United Methodist partners, all of whom participated in the house blessing by reading scripture, praying, and sharing memories. BDM leaders presented David with a quilt made by Brethren friends in the Southern Ohio district. While none of our group had

helped to hammer, paint, or clean this house, we represented those who did, reminding me of the Apostle Paul's words in I Corinthians 3:10: "I laid a foundation, and someone else is building on it." We each had a different part to contribute in ministry to this





homeowner, and none was more or less important than another.

As we left Lumberton at the end of the week, the long-term BDM staff on site was making plans for the impending arrival of Hurricane Florence a few days later. While the storm wasn't as devastating in Lumberton as projected, and the church which serves as the BDM base was spared major issues, many of the homes BDM crews had recently repaired sustained new damage due to the storm. BDM has been assessing how to offer continued assistance in the area.

We all can play a part in ministry to those whose homes—and lives—are being rebuilt by

Brethren Disaster Ministries, whether that is by praying for teams, buying items at the annual Disaster Relief Auction, or giving time to use our abilities on a project site.



BDM Work In Puerto Rico

The Sunday after Thanksgiving, I arrived at the San Juan airport in Puerto Rico. Near the baggage claim area, I found what I was looking for: a man holding a BDM sign.

Like me, Brian was a Brethren Disaster
Ministries volunteer. He and Sam flew in from
Ohio. We then found Carrie, the volunteer
manager, and went to the waiting van, where Al
from Pennsylvania was waiting to drive us up
into the mountains, to the community of
Castañer, in the central mountain region of Lares
and Adjuntas.

Driving into the mountains, we could see glimpses of homes in the valleys below with blue-tarped roofs, a sign that neither temporary nor permanent roofing had been installed. Our crew would spend the next two weeks repairing and rebuilding metal roofs, as well as repairing damage to walls and other structures. We also repaired the insides of houses with water or mold damage, painted and did cement and masonry work.

Our BDM work crew was housed at the Castañer Church of the Brethren (Iglesia de los Hermanos). After leaving the church grounds, we would drive about a half hour through winding mountain roads to different job sites in the area of Rio Prieto, Lares. When we arrived at the job site, we would work from about 7 am to 2:30 pm.

After we left the job site, we had free time to explore local shops and farms. During a trip to a nearby coffee plantation, we learned that 60 percent of the farm's coffee plants had been wiped out by Hurricane Maria, which hit the

island more than a year ago. The tour guide told us that his home on the coffee plantation was completely destroyed, and he now lives in public housing.

BDM began the Puerto Rico reconstruction project in September and plans on continuing to deploy work crews through 2019. As of early December, BDM volunteer manager Carrie Miller said 38 volunteers (including construction leaders and local volunteers) have worked more than 2,300 hours on various sites. Volunteers included a delegation earlier this year of Dominican volunteers who travelled to Puerto Rico to repay the help offered by Puerto Rican volunteers in 1979 after Hurricane David.

Despite the continuing impacts from the hurricane, the residents of the town were in a celebratory mood with the approach of Christmas. The town's plaza was the site for a children's Christmas program and we watched as the children recited plays, sang and played their instruments.

Some residents joked to our group that the Christmas celebration lasted from Thanksgiving until January.



In one church service, leaders reflected on the past year of hardship, but rejoiced in their blessings and the Christmas season. A Sunday evening cantata concluded with the song "Navidad." Many in the congregation openly wept as they listened to the moving melody resonating through the small sanctuary.

Paula Knudsen Burke travelled to Castañer and volunteered for two weeks with a BDM volunteer crew. She is a member of the Elizabethtown Church of the Brethren.

Travel costs for ANE congregations who travel to BDM work sites under the coordination of our District Disaster Coordinator, Robert Eisemann, may be reimbursed by funds from the Brethren Disaster Relief Auction and the ANE Helping Hands Benevolence Fund. Disaster Response continues to play a very important role in many of our ANE congregations. Our ANE District congregations provided a team of volunteers to support the work of Brethren Disaster Ministries *for 20 weeks out of 52 weeks in 2018!* That means that we had a group of volunteers from one or more of our ANE churches serving with Brethren Disaster Ministries for almost half of the work weeks in 2018! In addition several individuals from our ANE congregations spent one or more weeks serving with BDM.

Thanks to the generous support of the Brethren Disaster Relief Auction, our ANE District

was able to support the efforts of these volunteers by providing funding for the travel expenses of these groups travelling to and from the BDM rebuild location located in Lumberton NC.

BDM has been working in Marion County, S.C. and some surrounding counties since September 2017. Since April 2018, BDM is working out of a housing site in Lumberton, NC to serve homeowners in both states who are still recovering from Hurricane Matthew or the flooding that happened because of it.



It is our pleasure to be able to share with you proceeds from our 2018 Disaster Relief Auction efforts. Please find our Check #2385 for \$289,295 enclosed. We make this contribution to Brethren Disaster Ministries on behalf of the Atlantic Northeast District, the Southern Pennsylvania District, and all of our constituency. From this distribution, \$34,295 is restricted for domestic hurricane relief and \$255,000 is unrestricted.

We would like to note these additional distributions during 2018:

- \$16,000 for BDM SUV:
- \$15,000 directed to Flame Ministries to dig a well in Haiti;


