The Most Important One

Greetings Sisters and Brothers in the name of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ!

I remember well the feelings I had as I started my first pastorate. It was going to be fields of flowers and unicorn bliss—happily ever after like a Norman Rockwell painting.

And then something happened: People showed up.

Yes, we are a messy people. And yes, it can cause us to forget what is most important in our lives, the reason we exist, actually: Our relationships with——
1) God through His Son Jesus Christ; and 2) All others as we share Christ's transforming love with them.

And so we must always and everyday ask ourselves individually and as the church: What is most important in your life?

You see, because this is one of those pesky questions that you can't hide from. You may say that "this" or "that" is most important, but the truth is, your actions will show what it really is.



Are there times in our lives we elevate other things above our relationships with God and others? What are those things for you? What about for us as the church?

In Mark 11, Jesus enters Jerusalem and the crowds shout their hosannas. The next day, He goes to the temple and cleans it out, which doesn't sit well with the chief priests and teachers of the law.

So they questioned Jesus' authority. You know, who made you the boss, Jesus? Who anointed you King? Then they looked for a way to arrest Jesus, because they knew He had spoken the parable of the tenants against them. Then they ask Jesus a political question, followed by a convoluted theological question.

Finally, the teacher of the law brings it all into focus with his question:

Of all the commandments, which is the most important?

"Hear, O Israel, the Lord our God, the Lord is one. Love the Lord with all your heart, and with all your soul, and with all your mind, and with all your strength. And love your neighbor as yourself."

Even though there are many important things in this world to know and to do, we must be careful not to raise those up higher than God's command to love.

As I have stepped into this role as District Executive, it has opened up a whole new world for me in the life of the church - some in many great ways, and in some, that leave me scratching my head. As I sort through all the layers and inner workings of the church, with all the emails and questions I receive daily, sometimes I stop and think: How in the world did church get so complicated?! 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It serves as a tremendous reminder to me as to what is most important.

Because lots of things change over the generations. How we "do" church, our polity and policies, our buildings, our programs, staff, and styles have changed and will continue to change. You may embrace or grieve that depending on where you stand in all this.

The Jewish leaders had their agenda and were laser focused on achieving it, which was to bring down Jesus. Instead of being open to the possibility of who Jesus is, they did all they could to show He was a fraud. Instead of truly being in conversation with Jesus, they came to debate.

Instead of truly listening to Him and taking that step toward understanding, they were shut off from their own pride and didn't even give Him a chance.

We all have things that we hold important in our lives. We are all at different stages in our walk with Christ. And so may we encourage one another in our walk together. May we truly silence the noise and lift up the name above all names, that is Jesus Christ.

That is my prayer, and I hope yours as well for us as the Church of the Brethren. There is so much for us to do for Christ.

Listen. Listen to His voice. Listen to His Word. Listen to your brother and sister next to you, across from you. Listen, not iust to the words, but to the heart.

Listen to the most important one, that is Jesus Christ and His example of love. It is there that we are transformed in Him.

Cocalico House

In 1899 the Ephrata congregation was divided, with the new section being named the Springville Congregation. Springville initially had eight meetinghouses. Ten years later, in 1909, the Cocalico Meetinghouse was built at the Kurz burial ground near Cocalico. On land donated by Daniel Noll, the 36 x 50 feet brick meetinghouse was constructed and then dedicated on November 27, 1909. The sanctuary was 12 feet high, and there were two rows of benches with backs with three aisles.

Revival meetings were held there throughout the early 1900's. Sunday worship was rotated among the other meetinghouses, with Cocalico House usually hosting every other week until Sunday services became weekly in 1957. The congregation sang acapella until an organ was purchased in 1973.

In 1912 a shed was built for horses, but the automobile eventually eliminated the need for this structure, which was eventually removed. A Sunday

School was organized in 1918, and in 1939 an addition was built to add Sunday School rooms in front and in back of the sanctuary. In 1959 the Springville congregation divided into two, thereby

officially forming the Cocalico Congregation which celebrates its 60th anniversary this year.

In September, 1962, Cocalico House was enlarged and the arrangement of the sanctuary was reversed, so that the pulpit now faces the road. A 28 x 48 feet annex was constructed to provide more classroom space. Today the church building is readily seen along Cocalico Road in Denver, PA.

Germantown Starts 300th Anniversary Celebration

Germantown (Pa.) Church of the Brethren is starting a five-year celebration of its 300th anniversary this year. The congregation located in the Germantown neighborhood of Philadelphia is considered to be the "mother church" of the denomination as the first congregation that the Brethren established in the Americas.

The year 1719 is recorded in the *Church of the Brethren Yearbook* as the date of the start of the congregation, and is recorded in the *Brethren Encyclopedia* as the year Brethren first settled in Germantown. The official formation of the congregation wasn't until 1723, when the first Brethren baptisms in the Americas were held on Christmas Day in the Wissahickon River.

Over five years, 2019-2023, the congregation will celebrate its 300 years of Brethren heritage, said Germantown pastor Richard Kyerematen. The celebration also is hoped to begin a call to the denomination to refocus Brethren energy on urban ministry. This celebration can be a meaningful touchstone to the launch of the celebrations of the 300th anniversary of the Brethren, which took place at Germantown in 2007.

An informal kick-off for the celebration was held on Sunday, March 3, when Atlantic Northeast District executive minister Pete Kontra preached and Office of Ministry director Nancy Sollenberger Heishman was present to worship with the church.


What to do with your congregation's Historical Records?

All of us face the question, what do you save and what do you throw away? To provide some answers, the ANE District Historical Committee met with Rachel Grove Rohrbaugh, archivist at the Hess Archives at Elizabethtown College. Here is a FAQ summary to help all congregations with their decisions:

- Q. What exactly is stored in the Hess Archives?
- A. The archivist works closely with the Young Center to maintain secure, environmentally controlled storage of important documents related to church history, District history, and congregational history within both the Atlantic N.E. District and Southern PA District. The Archives has abundant information regarding the ministries performed by the District and many of its congregations from the past. It has programs from important highlights, such as the dedication of new church buildings and anniversary celebrations. Many of the publications of the Brethren Press are also available in the Hess Archives and High Library. You can find more information and digital collections at https://www.etown.edu/library/archives/.
- Q. Who uses the Archives?
- A. Students, professors, and other scholars use the materials for research and teaching. Congregations seek information on their past, particularly for anniversaries and other celebrations. People researching their family history also use the Archives.
- Q. What should I NOT send to the Archives?
- A. Financial reports, directories, monthly newsletters, and weekly bulletins should not be sent. If you have any questions about what materials should be kept, please contact Rachel.
- Q. Is there anything I SHOULD send to the Archives?
- A. Please continue to send congregational meeting minutes, membership lists (including births and deaths if available), and notices of important events such as the dedication of a new building, renovation or addition, or receiving a new minister. If you cannot provide proper storage for additional important materials worthy of preservation, ask Rachel if they can be transferred to the Archives. If a congregation leaves the District, their archival records are sent to the Hess Archives to assess what should be stored.

- Q. What if I have questions about how to store materials and electronic records?
- A. Rachel is willing to offer advice regarding safe storage of both paper materials and digital records within your congregation.
- **Q.** What about family papers?
- A. The Archives collects selected family and personal papers. They are especially interested in papers of conscientious objectors and missionaries as well as the papers of families and individuals with close connections to the College and the papers of prominent Brethren scholars. Exponential Church Planting Conference, 2019

Made For More

The Exponential Church Planting in Orlando, Fl. Was immersed with energy as 5600 church leaders gathered from all 50 states and 20+nations. The Atlantic Northeast District had 9 participants and 4 first timers. This remains the single largest Church Planting Conference in the US and possibly the planet.

The tangible presence of God was evident. In talking with our attendees we are still rejoicing over the momentum and blessing from the Lord that the Conference gave us.

In the Opening Session, the auditorium was standing room only and the Exponential Band led a powerful time of worship. We had a potent group of speakers with Dave Ferguson (founding and lead pastor of Chicago's Community Christian Church), Francis Chan (founder and former teaching pastor of Cornerstone Community Church), and Albert Tate (founder and lead pastor of Fellowship Church) unpacking the truth that only Jesus can fill everything in every way. Christ is the "More" we talked about throughout the week--

- People of God are made for more; Being more, doing more and going more— He's also made us to "Win more" was our focus.
- Albert Tate indicated, "We have gotten great at building big churches and have forgotten about having great impact...Stop Building Churches that look like you and start building churches that look like Jesus."
- Here's a powerful moment from Ed Stetzer (teaching pastor at Moody Church and Highpoint Church), "We need all hands on deck for God's Mission...We have to find ways to mobilize those who are made for more. I am tired of hoping for a movement, lam ready to put a stake in the ground and say let's do it altogether."

- Cynt Marshall first African American female CEO of a NBA franchise, the Dallas Mavericks stated, "As children of light look for opportunities to illuminate and inspire others".
 "What Jesus wants to do is outside of the church....the greatness of a church lies not in the seating of its people, but the sending of its people".
- "If the church got good at disciple making, church Planting would take care of itself... Evangelism and disciple-making is the primary calling of the Church"- JD Greear (pastor at the Summit Church).

With Love Feast, Easter, sermons to write, people to pray with, and outreach opportunities, I was not looking forward to spending the day with 100 others. In fact, as an introvert, I didn't want to spend the day with anyone.

I took a deep breath and I listened to the opening words of Pete when he shared, in my own understanding, we are here to build something new, a new relationship with one another, a common one that engages our whole being; however, in order to do that, we must share our stories, the depths of our lives.

My heart was lifted and I looked around the room, seeing people I have known for decades look back at me—smiling across the room, I started to feel joy. The day was focused on us sharing about our call, our need to give and receive care from

small groups deepened, words of affirmation and
prayer were shared, and joy for being in this space
emerged for me.

I am so deeply appreciative of those who came and spoke and reflected God's love for me and for all of those who gathered together. This will not be the last time we gather. God is good, friends!

BDM Work In Puerto Rico



On Saturday, January 19th, Roger Pepper, Kevin Becker, Joyce Shenk, Randy Hosler, Gary Kreiner, and myself, Zach Hosler, from Chiques COB, and Paul Hosler from Ephrata COB, left on a two-week work camp through Brethren Disaster Ministries to Castañer, Puerto Rico. After landing in San Juan, we were picked up by Lois and Lindy Frantz, who were the month-long BDM site leaders, and made the two and a half hour drive to Castañer. The housing was located on the property of the Castañer COB where we were able to attend the worship service on Sunday. We attended the Río Prieto COB on our second Sunday of the trip.

On Monday, we headed out for our first day of work. Four of us were dropped off to do a roofing job that a previous volunteer group had started and the rest went to what would become our main jobsite. The second group spent the day moving Cano and Minerva into a temporary home about a mile down the road. During hurricane Maria they lost much of their metal roof as well as some of their t1-11 siding. They had managed to patch things back up the best they could with whatever used materials they could find. However, what remained was a house with many roof leaks and mold that was not in good enough condition to salvage.

On Tuesday, we spent the day tearing down the house to nothing but the floors and the few small concrete walls remaining. We started rebuilding Wednesday, and by the end of the two weeks we had everything built, the metal roof on, windows installed, and much of the house stained. The final day on the jobsite was filled with mixed emotions as Minerva and Cano stopped in to say goodbye. We had become like family to them throughout the two weeks as they stopped by everyday to check out the progress and see how we were doing.

During our final meal together, we reflected on the two weeks serving and many shared similar feelings. There were many positive components to the work camp with just a few of those being the leadership, housing accommodations, and job site organization. It was great to be able to serve for an extended period of time and see a project from start to near completion.

Lastly, one of the best parts of this trip was being able to build a friendship with Minerva and Cano and see the joy on their faces as they saw their rickety old home replaced by a sturdy new one. It was such a blessing to be able to show them the love of Christ in a tangible way.


