2019 District Conference

The 50th Atlantic Northeast District Conference of the Church of the Brethren was held at Elizabethtown College, Leffler Chapel and Performance Center on October 4 & 5. Living the Legacy was the theme and focused on Job 29:2-3. "How I long for the months gone by, for the days when God watched over me, when his lamps shone upon my head and by His light I walked through darkness!" NIV

Moderator, Brian Berkey, pastor at Jennersville congregation, designed a beautiful Worship Service on Friday evening at the Leffler Chapel. A District Choir sang with piano, flute and organ accompaniment. An offertory for Children's Disaster Services was taken, and they received \$1,867. A superb message was delivered by Don Fitzkee. If you missed Don's sermon, you may find it on the ANE YouTube Channel (ANE District Church of the Brethren), or there is a link on our website (www.ane-cob.org). Lititz CoB was the host church for the weekend. They also were the host church 50 years ago.

Our 50 year ministers were recognized at a dinner sponsored by the Ministry Commission on Friday evening as well as newly Licensed, Ordained ministers. Pastors who have been recently placed, served as an interim as well as graduates of ACTS and TRIM programs were also recognized. William Cave of the Palmyra CoB, Ralph Detrick of the Elizabethtown CoB, Kenneth Gible of the Ridgeway Community CoB, and Wayne Mast of the Conestoga CoB were recognized for their 50 years of ministry and service.

Also Friday evening, ANE hosted a Networking Expo for those who wanted to learn more about CoB institutions and affiliated agencies. The following places were there: Camp Swatara, Brethren Disaster Services, COBYS Family Services, and Brethren Benefit Trust.

Saturday, October 5 was the business portion of the District Conference. A total of 169 Delegates attended, representing 58 out of 74 congregations.

Delegate and Non-Delegate check in was at full swing early. Those who wanted took advantage of the continental breakfast. Many attended the Bible Study led by Galen Hackman. Several families utilized the free childcare provided as well.

The gathering music was provided by the Brooklyn First Praise Team, and many hymns were sung throughout the day. There were many informational reports from the District Board, District Executive, Directors, Treasurer, Compelling Vision, Related Institutions, and ANE Youth. A special guest speaker, Amanda Dolan, who is a descendant of Alexander Mack, spoke about Brethren Heritage.

In the afternoon, one activity that was different with the 2019 District Conference was the time set aside for small group discussions. These discussions were focused on the ANE District Vision Statement and involved small groups of 5 to 7 persons with a facilitator discussing questions about: (1) those aspects of our Brethren heritage that relate to the Vision Statement and that unite us; (2) examples from the congregations about activities that reflect the Vision Statement; and (3) ways in which we can covenant and network together to move our vision forward. There were 39 small groups with more than 200 people that considered these questions and recorded their responses. The groups were organized randomly so that people from different congregations were working together. The responses from all of the participants are being reviewed and compiled and a report summarizing the results of the discussions will be issued.


Brian Berkey ended the session with a consecration of Karen Hackett of the Jennersville congregation as Moderator of the 2020 District Conference.

ANE District forms “The Way Forward” Team

At its June 20, 2019 meeting, our team—The Way Forward Team--was appointed by the ANE District Board and began meeting on August 13, 2019 to process the current struggles and differing convictions of congregations in our District. In addition, we have been asked to provide possible options for the District to consider as we work at reconciling those differences.

Our team is comprised of persons from diverse geographic areas in the District and diverse theological views and convictions. The ANE District Board has tasked/mandated us to bring a report(s) and recommendations to the Board—the result of “processing information received from the May 23rd meeting of ministers and leaders to be used as a guide within the boundaries of ANE’s vision statements as related to District and Denominational beliefs, practices and values.”

At our meetings we have worshipped together, studied the patterns found in the notes from the May 23rd meeting, discussed our observations from reviewing relevant ANE District and Denominational statements, and reflected on current conversations in light of historic events. We have also shared our personal visions for the future of the ANE District and the Church of the Brethren.

We are greatly encouraged that we have found working together to

be exciting and life-giving, as we feel that God is guiding our work. We are committed to working together, allowing “the peace of Christ to rule our hearts,” by honoring God, respecting one another, and serving the District congregations well. We see our work as an opportunity to submit carefully conceived options that reflect our commitment to Jesus Christ and a different way of doing business together.

We covet the prayers of the District congregations, and have hope that our work might be able to identify paths that the ANE District might choose to be able to move forward together in ways that reflect the call to “act justly, to love mercy and to walk humbly with our God.” Micah 6:8

Urban Ministries Initiative Update





He challenged the group to look for ways to invite those outside the church into the church. The participants had the opportunity to share their comments about this challenging topic in small group breakout sessions in both English and Spanish.

Worship teams from Brooklyn First, Germantown, Un Nuevo Renacer and Indian Creek all shared their unique spirit filled worship styles as they led the group in praise filled singing. Soloist Natasha McKinney from Mt. Wilson also added her unique singing voice to the day.

Thanksgiving Dinner Project

A Challenge from the Alpha & Omega Community Center and Florin CoB



Ruth Ann Barr, a member of Florin CoB, is one of the board members of the Alpha and Omega Community Center. She is familiar with and has experienced the food distribution work that is done by the Community Center 2 times a month. Last year she was aware that there were going to be turkeys given in November, so she suggested that Florin church members provide the ingredients for a Thanksgiving Dinner for the participants to have and make for their family.

Florin members agreed to help with ingredients and packing the bags. Into each bag they put:

- 1 qt. milk
- 1 dozen eggs
- Stove Top Stuffing
- 1 jar of gravy
- 1 can of corn
- 1 can of green beans
- 1 can of cranberry sauce
- Some white potatoes
- a few apples
- a few oranges



There were also baked pumpkin pies at the church the day before distribution.

This was a BIG job and challenge for one church! There were 150 turkeys given away and there were enough bags for those 150 turkeys.

This year the Alpha and Omega Board is planning a similar project. They have asked for all donations to arrive at the community center by Tuesday Nov. 26 which is 2 days before Thanksgiving. This allows an extra day for the distribution. The board feels this timing will work best so the food can be fresh for their meal. This year several people from Florin have committed to be there for the distribution. The Alpha and Omega Board would like to invite any other persons or churches that may be interested in helping at distribution to participate in that also.

Another Church 2 Church Opportunity!



The **Light of the Gospel Fellowship** meeting in Staten Island New York has reached out to offer a Church2Church opportunity. This is a great way for youth groups, men's groups, and any other small group in your congregation to serve and to meet others in our Church of the Brethren family.

For those not familiar with the Light of the Gospel, here is a description of this church in the words of Ikram Said who is the moderator of Light of the Gospel:

During the course of the last 17 years the Light of the Gospel has always had the idea of being a centralized location to assist those in need as all the brothers and sisters who migrate from the Middle East to the USA. ... The Light of the Gospel has become a place of receiving new families, and as well sending off families to continue their life and ministry in other cities and states as well as focusing on those who have chosen NYC to be their home for the time being. We have been blessed to be able to purchase a building in order to organize many functions for the church families, as well as have a place to host many groups who come for ministry in NY, or while they are on their way to other locations nationally and internationally.



Light of the Gospel is now offering an opportunity to groups from our ANE District to spend a day or more in Staten Island working with this church as they seek to improve their building. There are numerous project available including patching, spackling and painting various walls, doors and stairways. There are also needs for those with more construction experience including a request for help with tile and installation of molding.

For those groups who need to travel a distance, the church is able to provide overnight lodging

with members of the church or in the church building itself. This would enable your group to travel to the church on Friday evening to be prepared to work on Saturday. OR your group could plan to stay on Saturday evening and worship with this church family on Sunday before traveling back home. **This is a wonderful opportunity to serve and learn to know the church family at Light of the Gospel!**

Church 2 Church At Work!

Brethren Community Ministries, Harrisburg First Church of the Brethren

Brethren Community Ministries is the non-profit wing of the Harrisburg First Church of the Brethren, formed to carry out the community ministries activities of the church. BCM engages in numerous community development and welfare activities, including Friday food distribution, non-violence training for teens (Agape-Satyagraha), and computer classes.

BCM also owns a building in the South Allison Hill neighborhood that contains 6 residential apartments, usually leased to low-income, minority people. The apartments are seemingly in constant need of repairs and refurbishment.

BCM recently reached out to the Lampeter Church of the Brethren as part of the Church-to-Church program which coordinates assistance between churches, to install flooring in an apartment which basically had no flooring. That apartment was intended for the use of the church's BVSer, Alyssa Parker.

Art Kreider and some assistants came to the apartment in July of this year. Using donated vinyl, they covered one bedroom, the main living area and the bathroom. The difference was astonishing.

Alyssa has moved in and is now living close to the Harrisburg FCOB as she continues her year on South Allison Hill.

2019 MISSIONS WORKCAMP DOMINICAN REPUBLIC



The MEPA Team of the Cross-Cultural Connection Committee at Lancaster CoB organized a work camp this past summer. The letters in the word MEPA are the acronyms for **Manos Extendidas Para Ayudar - Extended Hands That Help**. The acronym MEPA is

based on Isaiah 59:1: "Surely the arm of the LORD is not too short to save, nor his ear too dull to hear." Therefore, the MEPA Team goes to other nations representing the arm of the Lord to fulfill the physical as well as the spiritual needs of the people in the villages of the countries we go during our mission trips.

The MEPA Team of the Cross-Cultural Connection Committee at Lancaster CoB organized a work camp in Los Cerros De Chalona COB in San Juan De La Maguana, Dominican Republic from June 18 to June 28, 2019.

A group of 10 participants helped with the construction of a church building. In this growing community the old church building which measures 15ft x 30ft is becoming too small for the people who meet for worship. The old one will be used as a kitchen and cafeteria to provide breakfast to the village children whose parents cannot afford to feed them before they go to school.




The new building measures 25ft x 45ft. It has been built structurally fit for a second-floor lever for future expansion.

This Same group also conducted VBS while they were there. During the VBS we ministered to 106 children. We used puppets as part of the VBS ministry. The theme this year was the story of Zacchaeus.

In addition, the MEPA Team also sent by shipment, 180 hygiene kits and 120 School supplies through New Windsor Maryland. The team also brought sports supplies for the youths.



Noah Ulrich, aged 7, is the elder son of Derek and Shila Ulrich, members of Palmyra CoB. When Noah was just four years old, he wanted to make some sort of Christmas gift for close friends and family. With the help of his mom and dad, he began making wooden nativity scenes.

In the first year the scene included Mary, Joseph and the baby Jesus. As word of this creative project spread, others also wanted to purchase some of Noah's creations. In that first year, Noah raised \$250 from his sales, which he donated to the Summer Lunch Program at the Caring Cupboard, the community food pantry which originated at PCoB.

The second year saw Noah adding Wise Men to his scene. Sales that year totaled \$800, which he again donated. Last year Noah added an Angel and a star and raised \$1,200! The Caring Cupboard was again the grateful recipient of these funds. Additional characters are being planned for each year until a complete crèche has been created.

Noah has been involved in every aspect of this project, including selecting some of the food items purchased for the Lunch Program. Last year's selections included cheese sticks, yogurt and ingredients to make chicken quesadillas.

For this spirit of generosity, Noah has been recognized by the Palmyra School District for a "Palmyra Pride" moment at a January School Board meeting. He was also acknowledged as a congregational volunteer in his church's annual All Church Appreciation event. Through his community activism, Noah is surely modeling a Christ-like spirit for us all.
