ANE 52nd District Conference OCTOBER 1-2, 2021

They encourage you to plan now to participate in both the 52nd District Conference to be held October 1st and 2nd, 2021, and the ANE Way Forward process, which will be a key topic to be covered at District Conference.

A number of our ANE District Clergy Women gathered for a lunch gathering via ZOOM on Tuesday February 9. Becky Fuchs, who recently retired from Mountville COB, and her special

guest, Sandy Brubaker, shared their insights regarding the Church of the Brethren Haiti Medical Project. In her

opening comments, Becky reminded us of the power of just a small piece of light in a dark world. That small piece of light was then compared to the efforts being made to reach out to



the very poor people who live in Haiti.



Sandy shared many pictures showing the extreme poverty in which the people in Haiti are living as well as photos of a number of medical clinics that have been

sponsored by the Haiti Medical Project. Sandy told the story of how one woman's life was totally changed when she was handed just a regular pair of reading glasses that allowed her to actually see and read a piece of paper. In our closing discussion our attendees marveled at the many ways that we tend to take our modern conveniences for granted until we have the opportunity to travel to another place in the world that does not have all of our modern conveniences. One attendee told the group that she had to leave to go to a medical appointment where she would wait patiently because she did not have to walk 6 hours just to get to the appointment.

In closing, Sandy Brubaker reminded us that donations are needed to continue to work of the Haiti Medical Project.

In Memoriam



The Reverend Curtis W. Dubble, 98, of Lititz, PA, died Monday, December 28, 2020 at Brethren Village where he resided. His life of service as an ordained minister and spiritual leader in the Church of the Brethren was predicated on the belief that God's love is

expressed through our human relationship with one another. He graduated from Elizabethtown College in 1949 and Bethany Theological Seminary in Chicago in 1952. He was granted an Honorary Doctor of Divinity at Elizabethtown College in 1974. Curtis accepted the call to serve several full-time pastorates including Brethren congregations in Canton, Ohio; Westminster, Maryland; York, PA; Lampeter, PA; and Lancaster, PA. He retired from full-time pastoral work in 1998. Reverend Dubble was also an inspirational leader regionally and nationally within the Brethren denomination. This included service to Bethany Seminary Board, General Board of the Church of the Brethren and serving as Moderator of the Church of the Brethren Annual Conference in 1990.

Helping Hands Benevolence Fund at Work!

The **ANE District Helping Hands Benevolence Fund** seeks to enhance local congregational ministries in responding to natural disasters and social ills in the ANE District. Consideration is given to congregations desiring to assist individuals or families who are victims of a disaster, as well as, individuals or groups requesting travel reimbursement when volunteering for trips coordinated by the District Disaster Response Coordinator.

Recently this fund was used to support the ministry of the Ambler Church of the Brethren. This congregation experienced over \$25,000 in water damage to their building on July 6, 2020, when a strong storm dumped approximately 6 inches of rain (at a rate of 3 inches an hour) on their community. Their insurance company would only cover \$2500 of this cost because this was considered flood damage. The ANE district was able to contribute \$10,000 to help cover some of the costs to repair the building.

Here is a portion of the thank you message we received from the treasurer of congregation:

"I'm awed by the generosity and compassion.....shown Ambler during this year of multiple challenges. I have shared with the congregation the appreciation and support I have felt from you and ANE as we've communicated over the year. Be assured that we will also share with the congregation what the blessings of the ANE Helping Hands Benevolence Fund are all about!"

Barnabas Fund Update

Studying scripture together is key to a compelling vision for the Church of the Brethren

"Together, as the Church of the Brethren, we will passionately live and share the radical transformation and holistic peace of Jesus Christ through relationship-based neighborhood engagement. To move us forward, we will develop a culture of calling and equipping disciples who are innovative, adaptable, and fearless."

It seems a long time ago that the idea of a compelling vision was broached in 2017 at Annual Conference. Following is the original guiding statement of the Compelling Vision Working Group, adopted at the beginning of our work together.

"Confessing Jesus Christ as Teacher, Redeemer, and Lord, we desire to serve Him by proclaiming, professing, and walking in his way together bringing his peace to our broken world. Join us in reclaiming a new passion for Christ and helping set a course for our future as the Church of the Brethren serving him in our communities and in the world!"

This statement, along with our common commitment to scripture, set the trajectory for our work together. Many times during the last two years we reminded ourselves that these common confessions and commitments made our work worthwhile.

Much has been altered since the Compelling Vision process began. Some congregations have chosen to leave the Church of the Brethren, the need for structural reform in the church has become ever more evident, and COVID-19 has cast an aura of uncertainty regarding the future nature of congregational life.

Amid those significant dilemmas I suggest to you there is nothing more important than studying scripture together to deepen our common commitment to Christ. In the Dec. 21 issue of Newsline, Rhonda Pittman Gingrich, chair of the Compelling Vison Working Group, outlined 13 Bible studies developed by a team of writers that build on the themes of the compelling vision. These studies will be released in mid-February with sample lessons coming in January. As study groups are organized, I encourage you to participate with other sisters and brothers.

We live in a vulnerable, fragile time. The compelling vision points us to the centrality of relationships standing at the heart of the gospel– relationship with our risen Lord, with fellow believers, and with people in our neighborhoods and communities. O Lord, soften our hearts to hear your voice and each other.

The Program & Arrangements Committee of the Church of the Brethren Annual Conference has announced a denomination-



wide online worship gathering titled "Venturing Forth Boldly as a Faith Family," scheduled for Saturday, Feb. 27, at 8 p.m. (Eastern time). In a season of disruption and despair, the service will assure us of what "God has prepared for those who love him" (1 Corinthians 2:9) and how we can faithfully respond. The theme is taken from the proposed compelling vision for the Church of the Brethren, with its call for Brethren to "venture forth boldly as a faith family, expectant and innovative, serving others and the God who makes all things new." The scripture theme is 1 Corinthians 2:9-10: "But, as it is written, 'What no eye has seen, nor ear heard, nor the human heart conceived, what God has prepared for those who love him'these things God has revealed to us through the Spirit; for the Spirit searches everything, even the depths of God." Congregations are invited to consider using this for their own Sunday morning worship service on Feb. 28, or any later date. Annual Conference Moves to an Online Event

The Program and Arrangements Committee has determined that the 2021 Annual Conference will be entirely online. This was a difficult decision to make since last summer's Annual Conference needed to be cancelled entirely because of COVID-19. While we know that meeting in person eventually will be safe again, we sadly do not believe that it will happen in time to safely have an in-person event at the end of June 2021.

We are offering a one-time reduced price for non-delegate adults to register for the online Annual Conference for only \$99. That fee will support the ministry and on-going expenses of Annual Conference and will give non-delegates access to:

- •all six business sessions
- all Insight and Equipping Sessions
- •all networking events

•a virtual concert by Fernando Ortega. Ortega is a multi-Dove award winner and singer-songwriter whose hits include "This Good Day" and "Jesus, King of Angels"

resource sessions led by Tod Bolsinger, best-selling author of Canoeing the Mountains: Christian Leadership in Uncharted Territory. Bolsinger is the vice president and chief of leadership formation at Fuller Seminary in Pasadena, Calif.
•daily Bible studies, along with Insight Sessions, led by Michael

Gorman, author of more than 20 books on biblical theology. Gorman is the Raymond E. Brown Chair in Biblical Studies and Theology at St. Mary's Seminary and University in Baltimore, Md., and a frequent lecturer at church and clergy gatherings.



Note: All five worship services will be available free of charge to non-registered persons.

Delegate fees will remain at \$305 and includes access to all of the above in addition to the right to vote during the business sessions and participation in virtual "table talk" discussions of the proposed compelling vision for the Church of the Brethren.

Delegates will need to have access to a computer or mobile device with Internet connectivity and sufficient computer skills to participate in an online event.


