Paul H. Boll passed away on Friday, April 29, 2022. He finished his secondary education at Messiah Academy and earned a Bachelor of Arts degree in business management from Bridgewater College. He also attended Bethany Theological Seminary in preparation for pastoral ministry. Paul served the Shippensburg Church of the Brethren and Quakertown COB, both in Pennsylvania, in addition to Brethren congregations in West Virginia, Virginia, and Maryland. He was employed as assistant administrator by Peter Becker Community in Harleysville prior to accepting the position of administrator at Lebanon Valley Brethren Home in Palmyra (now Londonderry Village) in 1979. In 2011 he was recognized by the Church of the Brethren for 50 years of ordination.

Philip E. Norris, died peacefully on Monday, May 2, 2022 at Brethren Village. Born in Sweden, he was the son of the late Reverend Glen E. and Lois Detweiler Norris who were serving as missionaries for the Church of the Brethren. Phil attended Juniata College,

From 2008-2012 she worked with Elizabethtown College as Director of Church Relations.

In addition to pastoral ministry, Donna served on local, district and denominational boards and committees as well as providing leadership for congregations, educational workshops and women's retreats. She was a talented musician and played piano and organ. She was a devoted member of the Elizabethtown Church of the Brethren.



Outreach Update

Emma, a 7-year-old girl with a mercy heart, called Pastor Brian Messler at 7am one Saturday morning to share her heart for making hygiene kits for those that are homeless in downtown Ephrata. From there, our Missions Coordinator met with Emma and 2 other girls, Elizabeth and Summer who also attend ECOB, to get an idea of what these hygiene kits should include. They had excellent ideas including making feminine hygiene bags as well! This was a fantastic idea as these products can be costly and many homeless or low-income families struggle to purchase these items regularly. The girls unanimously agreed that the name of all these kits would be "Care Kits".





The group decided to put a bar of soap, toothbrush, toothpaste, a washcloth, comb, 10 band aids, and deodorant in the bags. We added lotion and Neosporin to the bags as well. They planned to make Men's, Women's, and Children's hygiene kits and have them available to those that would come to City Gate- Ephrata when our church would be serving lunch to those in the community.

Signup sheets were created, and our congregation happily signed up and donated everything that was needed for this project. The goal was 50 men's bags, 50 women's bags and 20 kid's bags. 50 feminine hygiene bags were also made by the missions coordinator and put into opaque bags for discretion.

All the donated items were then separated and set out on tables in the room where the kids meet for church. Those that attend kids church, kindergarten through 4th grade, assembled the bags with the assistance of some adults and a few from our youth group.

The kits were taken downtown on February 27th and were available for anyone to take that needed them. Those that came through the line were delighted and grateful for these bags. Some also took a bag for a neighbor who they felt could use one. Emma, Elizabeth and 2 other girls in our ECOB students group helped to serve downtown that day.

ECOB will be providing lunches in downtown Ephrata on 4 other dates in 2022 and will be taking these "Care Kits" along to share.

It is encouraging to see these kids being outward focused and leading the congregation with this missions project. ECOB's kids are being Jesus in the neighborhood and we pray that they will continue to be and bring others along side of them. People often say that our kids are the church of the future but our children are actually the church of today.





Children's Disaster Service Training Workshop at Lititz Church of the Brethren



Lititz Church of the Brethren hosted a Children's Disaster Services Volunteer Workshop on May 13 and 14, 2022. Thirteen persons from Central PA, Maryland and New Jersey participated in the training. Trainers were from Virginia and Michigan.

Thirty volunteers from the church helped with promoting the event, setting up the training room and AV equipment, providing food and serving meals and registering the Child Care Giver candidates. The Central PA Chapter of the American Red Cross provided cots so participants could experience a shelter-like situation. The candidates completed the training and are now in the decision-making process of becoming certified Disaster Child Care Givers.



Youth Update:

9 Square in the Air Tournament

Youth Ministries in the district were invited to a NEW youth event held Sunday, May 22. The group joined together to play "9- Square-in-the-air." The event was a first attempt at tournament play of the game. Teams registered from 6 different congregations and 42 attended the day at the Lititz COB.

The game, "9-Square-in-the-air," has been around for at least 12 years and began in youth ministry (or so the story goes from the company who produces the equipment). The game has been played at both National Youth Conference and during Jr High Conferences in Elizabethtown. 9-Square is a combination of volleyball and 4 square. Most of the participants had never played the game before but successfully learned in the first 30 minutes of the event.





The "court" uses a PVC pole structure creating 9 raised squares for players to stand inside. Two courts were used, one for practice and the other for competing for the highest score. Along with the score on the court, teams had the opportunity to add to their score by correctly answering Bible trivia questions during each round of games. Team scores were accumulated in three rounds of play. Three teams of three players competed in each round of matches. Pizza and snacks were provided by the district.

A team from Mt. Wilson won for the highest score in play and a team from the Lititz COB won for the highest score with trivia points added. Thanks to Youth Leaders, Linda Byers (Lancaster COB) and Ken Trovinger (Lititz COB) for coordinating and organizing the event. Church2Church: Reaching out to share with a church in need

When Un Nuevo Renacer, a Spanish speaking church in the ANE District, faced a significant challenge in recent months, Pastor Carolina Izquierdo reached out to the ANE District to share their dilemma and found a solution for their need.

Un Nuevo Renacer has a significant number of young people who are a part of their fellowship. Thirteen of those youth and 3 advisors were hoping to attend National Youth Conference which will take place this summer July 23 -28 in Fort Collins Colorado. But covering the expenses of travelling to and attending this event was a problem for this group. This is a young church with young families who have limited



financial resources. The youth successfully worked together to raise some money with a very successful bake sale at Mountville church and were able to raise \$600.00. But the expenses for 16 people to travel to Fort Collins, CO were much greater than the money they were able to raise.

The good news is that other congregations in the ANE district were willing and able to provide the necessary financial resources needed to allow all the 16 participants to register and to purchase airfare for National Youth Conference. Brethren Disaster Ministries Trip-Coventry Church of the Brethren: May 28-June 5

With great enthusiasm and energy, a group of 15 volunteers gathered in a circle to be protected in prayer by Pastor Mark Muthler. We piled into 2 vans, with snack provisions for the trip. Our group age ranged between 14

and 76 with a strong contingent of youth. Thus, we embarked on a two day trip to our destination on the other side of Nashville, Tennessee staying overnight in the awe inspiring and magnificent mountainous creation of God: Salem - Virginia. Here we were well nourished and sheltered by the loving generosity of 2 host families (and the same on our return trip).

What a blessing to be greeted in Waverly at the Presbyterian Church by our friend, sister in Christ, and member of our own church – Lynn Evans. With temperatures of each person measured and whistles wet, we settled into the softest beds ever imaginable on a sleep away trip. Monday morning started



us out in 3 vehicles to 3 different work-sites. On a street with the same name as our home-owner, one group was blessed by our efforts of spackling, painting, and floor laying. This home provided the group with a lux-ury "porta potty" (AC, music, lights indicating occupation, and a 1500 Gallon water tank, the likes that was

the envy of others). But better still, we had the privilege of sitting under a tree next to the brook (that backed up and caused damage to the bridge access to the homes and this home). Most amazing for this group, was the opportunity to fellowship and pray with the owner of the home during our lunch-time.

Our second home provided opportunities to paint the cinder block walls, lay flooring, and add doors. No running water in this home, and the group had to travel to a nearby finished home to use the facilities. This group met the owner and did some evening work, as well as adding additional help to allow the owner to move in sooner. Our third home

required much spackling and painting as well as adding a door. We were well fed (snacks, meals and buffet-style lunch assembling).

We explored the area, celebrating a members' birthday at Sonic. Many were thrilled when the Milkshakery across from the church opened midweek to allow sweet delights to be obtained. We were spiritually fed by evening devotions led by mostly our young people. Much laughter and joy was had as members joined in board games and singing. Several members also spent early mornings in the church sanctuary for personal devotions. We rejoice in

the blessings of God, keeping the group safe and affording us the opportunity to serve while being spiritually enriched by our fellowship with each other.
