creating spiritually healthy New Testament
congregations who covenant and network
together to further the Kingdom of God." These
discussions will consider the positive things
about our legacy and heritage and how we can
use them to further our vision.

I urge you to be in prayer for everyone who will plan and participate in District Conference including your role as a participant in worship and fellowship.

## Venezuela, a Nation Hungry for Hope

Joel Peña, pastor of the Alpha and Omega congregation in Lancaster, shared this update with us regarding the state of the Church of the Brethren in his home country of Venezuela. Many of Joel's family currently live in Venezuela.

During the last century and with the discovery of petroleum, Venezuela was named the Saudi Arabia of South America. Foreigners from all the world came to Venezuela looking for hope and future. Italians, Spanish, Arabians, French and people from all Latin America came and established here. At the same time, the country developed an economy based at petroleum richness. As a natural, it was easy to be used to a comfortable way of life. Nowadays, Venezuela faces the hardest crisis of its history. The population can't access the basic stuff they need for living, not because they can't find them, but because of the hyper-inflation, in which the salary is about 5 dollars per month where a family need around 400 hundred to cover the expenses. Because of this, Venezuela has been experiencing an exodus of Venezuelans calculated in about 4 million people running away from hunger.






The families in Venezuela are suffering massive disintegration and they are losing the hope and reason of life. The people of the Church of Christ of Venezuela is facing same pressures and difficulties of the social, political and economic crisis. As consequence, many ministers and lay people have been migrating abandoning their church work and families.

That's why this generation of Venezuelans urgently needs an approach to the Scriptures through radical discipleship and a relational and practical gospel that helps them to understand the simple message of the Gospel of Jesus Christ.

In 2016 Church of the Brethren was established and now we are located in 30 urban localities and in 10 of the 57 indigenous ethnic groups distributed in more of the 912,000 square kilometers of this country. This represents a great logistical difficulty for the founding team, only compensated by the enormous satisfaction of seeing the different congregations practicing the Trine baptism, the washing of the feet, the Agape Feast, participation in ecumenical activities, approaching the communities through the testimony of Jesus Christ and raising their families in the fear of God.





Brethren from the beginning. Likewise, we are working on the establishment of four missionary routes in different regions of the country where the indigenous ethnic groups live which will allow us to continue advancing in the evangelistic area reaching these peoples with the support of brothers and sisters from different parts of the world, who want to join the arduous task of bringing hope to the people of Venezuela

looking for help as they step out on a new venture. Here is how this ministry was described in the application:



### Brethren Disaster Ministries — REBUILDING HOMES ..... GIVING HOPE



Listen, can you hear the sounds of rebuilding? The ring of a hammer, the buzz of a saw and the swish, swish of fresh paint being rolled on a wall? The people in Lumberton, NC and Nichols, SC suffered significant flooding and damage to their homes twice in two years! First, Hurricane Matthew hit in Sept. 2016, and then Hurricane Florence brought flooding rains in Sept. 2018.

The little town of Nichols, SC is short on hope! They are just 50ft. above sea level which means that flood waters drain very slowly and cause a lot of damage!



Last year a group from White Oak worked hard all week finishing drywall and painting at Dianna's house. She lives in a homey, blue-sided bungalow

surrounded by towering pines and filled with memories of many family gatherings. She was thankful to move back into her house in Spring of '18. But then Hurricane Florence unleashed her fury and soaked the area again! After being in her home only a few months, Dianna was forced to evacuate! Steve Keim and Kim Gingerich, BDM leaders, met with her and assured her that they would help repair her home ... again! They also helped her apply for a grant to raise her house 4 ft which would give some added peace of mind.

In March of 2019 we were given the privilege of working on her house



and spent the week finishing drywall, sanding it smooth, and painting the entire house with bright, white paint. On Friday, Dianna stopped by to see the progress and was so grateful for the work that was accomplished. She really liked the clean, white walls. Obviously the house was filled with home-made memories and love, because



soon her daughter, son-in-law and a cousin arrived to see the work, too!

Even though Dianna is somewhat fearful to move back in because of the possibility of another hurricane or flood, she quoted II Timothy 1:7 with confidence: "God has not given us a spirit of fear, but of power and of love and of a sound mind."

BDM trips provide many blessings. Obviously, the homeowners appreciate the help to return to their homes. And secondly, working, eating and fellowshipping with fellow Brothers and Sisters in Christ is just wonderful!! During our week in March we enjoyed an evening of

acapella singing, some lively games of Dutch Blitz, a walk downtown to the Lumber River bridge, and an evening at the local bowling alley where they generously treated us to free games in re-



turn for our part in helping their community!

If you have never gone on a BDM trip, we would encourage you to consider joining a group for a week and become the hands and feet of Jesus as you provide hope to a family in need.

## BDM Mission Work Trip to Lumberton, N.C. — Florin CoB

When our new Pastor, Tom Weber planned to participate, promoted and organized our Florin COB BDM work trip to Lumberton, N.C., my husband (Glenn) and I knew we wanted to go. Our plan was to leave on Mother's Day 5/12, for a five day work trip. Little did I realize that Mother's Day would be a common thread throughout our week.

Our housing was located in a beautiful church, First Presbyterian Church of Lumberton, where we also enjoyed delicious meals (prepared by a volunteer), and we packed our lunches for the work day which lasted from about 8:00 a.m.- 4:00 p.m. Our sleeping quarters were comfortable, and our showers were very clean and one of our highlights after our days' work activities.

to roofers), and not a drop of rain. I believe our Lord ordered this wonderful weather, and safe workdays; along with safe travels.

My first 4 days, I got to meet our homeowner, who was a young widow of three children. Her teenage daughter was looking forward to her prom that week. Our work crew gave this Single Mom a bouquet of pink carnations given to us when we ate at a local Diner on Mother's Day. The waitress gave each Mom a flower on our special day to enjoy for the week. This homeowner was so appreciative for our whole group of volunteers, and looked forward to when her home would be completed in a few days. Each of us sat with church and community members. My husband and I had the opportunity to meet a couple and their Mother, who were affected by both hurricanes (Matthew in 2016 and Florence in 2018). They shared how their Mom was going through cancer treatments (who is now healed) during the first hurricane. They shared how very appreciative they were for all this church and our volunteers meant to them during double disasters. This close knit family eagerly shared their stories and hugs with us. Our memories made together made our Mother's Day week away from our own families worthwhile.

My last warmer workday was spent with another homeowner,
Davey who insisted on helping me push a large roll of insulation
up the attic ladder. He shared with me how much he missed his

adopted Mother (with fresh memories from Mother's Day, a few days before). He also was so thankful of all the work our volunteers were accomplishing at his home, including insulating the attic, ceiling in family room, and working on drywall. It made Davey feel good to be able to help, and to show his appreciation.

After breakfast one morning, I had the opportunity to share a devotion "Stepping Out", which I dedicated in memory of our dear friend (Ron Mellinger, who had organized several BDM trips, and encouraged our church to participate). This devotion's Scripture was taken from Matthew 14: 22-33. Like Peter, when we step out in faith, we open a door for God to work. We may perform tasks, experience the results of a concerted team effort we would not dream of doing on our own, or receive a hug or a smile from someone. Prayer: Gracious and loving God, help us to step out in faith when we hear your call to reach out to others. Amen.

Our overall work group of 30, which included 15 from ANE District, and 15 from the Maryland area. We divided into 6 work groups with 4-6 in each. Three groups stayed local with homes 10-15 minutes away, and 3 groups commuted to S.C. about 45 minutes away. Our groups all had a variety of work including; drywall, painting, flooring, roofing, caulking, siding, installation of kitchen cabinets, insulation, and removing old debris from flooded homes.

Our weather was perfect, with only two warmer, humid days, but mostly cool mornings and days in the 70's, with beautiful sunshine (not as inviting

## Just a Little Challenge

We have all been reading and hearing stories about all kind of natural disasters that have taken place in recent months. Floods, fires, and tornados have been occurring all around the country.



One of the ways we can all help the recovery efforts

from these disasters is by providing clean up buckets that can be used in the clean-up efforts. The Brethren Service Center in New Windsor, Maryland accepts kits year round on behalf of Church World Service, where they're stored until disaster strikes. Then, they're shipped from New Windsor to disaster sites in the U.S. and around the world. According to Terry Goodger, rebuild program assistant with Brethren Disaster Ministries, the warehouse had under 3,000 buckets as of the end of May 2019. This is really low for the beginning of hurricane season.

In recent months, some of our ANE Congregations have been stepping up to fill this need with a challenge.

On November 17, 2018, Annville COB posted a Clean-Up Bucket challenge on Facebook. After completing 250 clean up buckets in one hour, the church introduced the #250bucketchallenge. Their question: "What if every CoB made 250 buckets? Imagine the impact that simple act would have. We are calling out McPherson CoB, Ephrata CoB, and Elizabethtown CoB."

A few months later, Elizabethtown accepted that challenge. On June 3, 2019, these words were posted on Etown's Facebook page. "What a blessing that challenge has been for us in Etown. Our Witness Commission led the way and the congregation responded with generosity and enthusiasm. Yesterday, we assembled 275+ buckets."

From the BDM website, we see these words, "Anyone can assemble relief kits at any time of year. Your support of this program helps to ensure that enough Kits are ready to go immediately, whenever and wherever they're needed most."

Perhaps you and/or persons in your congregation would like to accept the challenge of completing some clean up buckets. Just a few buckets (25 or 50) will be a blessing for those who receive them. Or maybe you would like to accept the challenge and do even more buckets than Annyille or Elizabethtown.
